MORE ARCTIC BIRDS NOW ON THEIR WAY TO THE SOUTH

A despatch this week from Iroquois Falls says:-"Further evidence of a hard winter is now appearing in the visitation to this district of the Arctic grouse or ptarmigan. These birds, which usually inhabit only the barrens of the North are pure white in colour, with a black or black-striped tail. One was seen Tuesday at Morgan's Creek, back of Perry Lake.
