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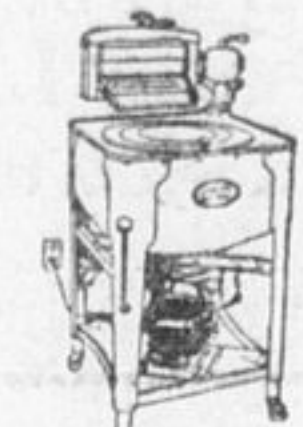
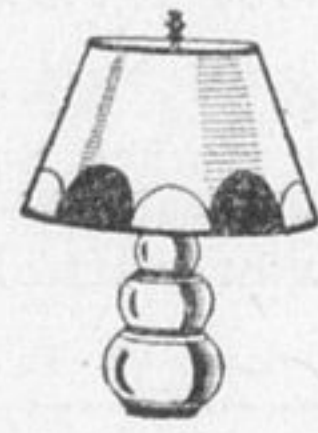

WHISTLING PIGEONS TO HELP GUARD THE FORESTS

The latest device to assist in the guarding of Ontario's forests from fire is described in the following extract from a recent bulletin issued by the Natural Development Bureau of the Department of the Interior at Ottawa: "Travellers in the north woods of Ontario next summer may be astonished when they hear and see what they may take to be a new species of bird, and into their heads may pop visions of whistling swans and wild pigeons. They may see the birds, read pigeons, and hear the whistle, but the two are separate entities, joined it is true but only for a space and then to carry out an idea.

Next spring, after a period of training, teams of homing pigeons will be transported to various fire patrol points where communication by wireless is now difficult or impossible. Reports of fires, forced landings and important messages may be relayed by the use of these birds to the base camps of the Provincial Air Force. The whistle! Reasons for Alarm

During the past few weeks this column has been drawing attention to other organizations trying to gain a foothold among returned soldiers. Reference was also made to the manner certain factions were securing the sympathy of unemployed returned soldiers. This has become so acute that members of the Provincial Command have taken up the cudgels and are warning all returned soldiers to get out of these organizations. Lt.-Col. F. J. Picking at a meeting held at Stratford gave details of these various organizations and warned all the men present to keep away from them and stick by the Canadian Legion. Others of the Provincial Command have issued similar warnings, and the hope is expressed that the warnings will be heeded and all will rally around the Canadian Legion and the Union Jack. The writer of this column made a quartette out of some of these agitators and it has come to pass that there must be hundreds of them. It would be to the advantage of all returned men to become organized, and one body only should be at the head. It is a known fact that several bodies all fighting for one cause cannot make much headway. Since 1918 Canada has experienced this to some extent. The returned soldiers had about ten different bodies to join, all as good as one or another, but not having the numerical strength to put any measure over. The Canadian Legion was started and inside of two years all these other organizations had been amalgamated in one body with the result that governments began to look up and heed its requests. At the present time a committee is sitting studying the entire pension legislation. The regranting of pensions to those who had commuted same and the reboarding of men who had a claim for pension was entirely a Legion move. Not satisfied with the working of the government machinery in this respect the Legion made suggestions to the officials and the committee now sitting, fourteen years after the war ended, is the result—a triumph of organization under one body.

COOKING THE GOOSE AND TRIMMINGS FOR CHRISTMAS

The traditional Christmas goose makes a very delicious and inexpensive main dish for the Yuletide feast, says a writer in a Domestic Science column in the press. To begin with select a young goose (this may be told by its brittle windpipe, white skin, plump breast and yellow feet). Singe, draw, wash and wipe the goose. Beat the breast flat, draw up the legs and skewer or the both legs and wings close to the body. Rub over with butter and dredge with flour, salt and pepper. Stuff with the following dressing: One pint stale bread crumbs, two small onions, boiled and mashed, half cup boiled rice, one teaspoon salt, quarter teaspoon pepper and half cup milk. Roast in a covered pan, placing strips of bacon over the breast. Allow a little more than twenty minutes to the pound. Baste frequently with the bacon drippings and fat from the goose. **Giblet Gravy:** Boil the giblets slowly two hours, or until tender, with a slice of onion, three peppercorns and a blade of mace. When ready to make the gravy take two tablespoons of oil from the roasting pan and stir into it two tablespoons of flour. Add the water the giblets were boiled in, and either water or milk enough in addition to make the gravy of the right consistency. Add giblets chopped very fine and season to taste.
