**Gift Suggestions for Christmastide**

List That May Help the Busy Buyer who has Forgotten the Advice to Shop Early. Ideas for Gifts for Men, Boys, Girls, Women.

"I don't know what to get him—her!"

How often is that remark heard, especially a few days before Christmas when much of the Christmas shopping has been done, but there remains a number of gifts that simply must be secured, yet the mind seems a blank. Ideas simply will not come.

It may not be a question even of money! The allowance for the gift may be large enough to apparently give lots of scope for choice, yet the thought will not come. One way out of the difficulty is to go into one of the stores of Timmins and district, tell your trouble to one of the staff, and the chances are that you will be helped out. "But what store should I go in?" asks the worried man or woman, thus bringing up the old problem in a new way. "If you will read the advertisements of town and district stores for the last month or two you will get lots of suggestions," is another reply that may be made. The honest Christmas shopper may reply:—"I wish I had done so, but I haven't time for that now."

Well, nothing is hopeless in this world, not even the depression. There is always somebody to help out!

For instance, here is a list of gift ideas, gathered from hundreds of advertisements published this year. The list covers hundreds of items ranging from the inexpensive to the costly, from ten-cent toys to articles costing hundreds of dollars.

Remember, the list is only to suggest ideas,—to get the "old bean working," as Reginald said. Here is the list:—

**For Men**

For wearing—Dressing gown, dress shoes, English blazer, house coat, pyjamas, dress shirts, dress vest, ties, gloves, silk, leather, or knitted wool, hosiery, spats, silk scarf, silk handkerchief, silk hat, silk pyjamas, slippers, box of linen handkerchiefs, box of collars, fancy suspenders, sweater coat.

Knitted vest, bath robe, lounge robe, smoking jacket, gauntlets, dancing slippers, golfing jacket, knitted scarf, umbrella, walking cane.

Box of cigars, case of 50 or 100; cigarettes, smoking set, smoking jacket, humidifier, cigar or cigarette holder, ash tray, set of pipes, tobacco pouch, cigarette case, cigar lighter.

For sports—Golf clubs, lawn bowls, snowshoes, moccasins, skiing equipment, hunting rifle, hunting knife, mackinaw coat.

For games—Pool or billiard table, dumb-bells, punching bag, boxing gloves, card table, poker set, chess set.

Leather goods—Fitted club bag, dressing case, military brushes, case of collars, manicule set, writing case, arm chair, ash tray, golf score book, card case, pocket book, key case, bill fold.

For the lover of music—Gramophone, player-piano, piano, gramophone records, record folios.

Furniture—Reading chair, book case, reading or desk lamp, writing desk, book ends, den table, ornaments for den, desk clock, telephone cabinet, radio set, regular or short wave.

Jewelry—Watch and chain, wrist watch, signet ring, cuff links, studs, vest buttons, dinner jacket, silver flash, cigar cutter, watch chain charm, lodge emblems, gold-handled penknife.

Read over the above list and it should set you thinking of a score of other things equally desirable as gifts. Don't overlook the idea of books! Most men have a taste in literature and if you know what they like you will make no mistake in giving a book or a magazine.

**For Girls and Boys**

For sports—Skates, hockey sticks, skis, snowshoes, toboggan, bobsleigh, sled, air rifle, moccasins, mackinaw coat, knitted toques, scarves and gloves, winter sports knickers. Indoor baseball outfit, gymnasium suits, dumb-bells, punching bags, boxing gloves, Indian clubs, fencing sets, roller skates junior pool and billiard sets, home gymnasium outfits.

Fur—Coats, jackets, hats, gauntlets, etc.

Knitted wear—Suits, hosiery, jackets, caps, gloves, sweaters.

Silk—Handkerchiefs, scarves, ties, girl's party dress, girl's lingerie.

General clothing—Coats, knickers, raincoats, dressing gowns, pyjamas, hosiery, slippers.

Jewellery—Girl's bangle, pocket watch, wrist watch, watch chain, silver or pearl-handled penknife, rings, girl's necklace, girl's brooch, tiepin, cuff links.

Pets—Puppy dog, kitten, guinea pigs, canary, rabbit, parrot, goldfish, pair of bantams, Shetland pony.

School requisites—Fountain pen and pencil set, school bag, music case, desk for home study, pencil sharpener, globe, atlas, desk light.

Miscellaneous—Games, pictures, books, musical instruments, camp knife, flashlights, cameras, pedometer microscope, moving picture outfit, diary, folding drinking cup.

Girl's small sewing case, girl's bracelet, pocket dictionary, book of tickets to skating rink, book of tickets to movies, brush and comb sets, mirrors, manicule sets, military brushes.

Subscription to boys' or girls' magazine, collar box, coin purse, small-sized umbrella, rubber boots, waterproof cape and hat, box of stationery, writing case, bicycle, short wave radio set, roller skates, eatables girls' dressing set or case.

Football, model airplane, puzzles, "The Book of Knowledge," pocket-book or purse, writing paper.

Gifts of money can usually be depended on to please even the most captious boy or girl of school age.

**For Small Children**

Toys—Rocking horse, indoor swing, nursery rhymes for gramophone, kid-

die car, miniature aeroplanes, box of paints, mechanical autos, fire reels, engines, trains, velocipedes, sleighs, child-propelled motor car, picture books.

Vari-coloured balls, children's tents, building blocks, mama doll, harness with bells, musical box, stuffed animals that move and speak, Jack-in-the-box, doll's house, miniature stove, tiny kitchen set, set of dishes, indoor quilt set.

Stencils of animals, doll clothes, paper cut-outs, games, toy soldiers, toy ships, bubble pipes, doll carriages, clowns, erector sets, cradles, toy telephones, rattles, sand toys, tricycles, toy pianos, doll furniture.

Filled stockings, circus toys, fish ponds, magic lanterns, moviegraphs, doll trunks, toy swords, toy guns, miniature golf sets, bank, post office, marbles, jacks, skipping rope, washable leather dolls.

Wearables—Jersey suits, sailor suits, dresses, slippers, rubber boots, toque, scarf and mitten set, bib, leggings, gloves, hosiery, sweater and sweater coats, blouses, shirts.

Ties, belts, Peter Pan suits, knitted suits, coloured handkerchiefs, socks, party frocks.

Miscellaneous—Unbreakable dishes, mugs, brush and comb, child's size table, chair, bureau, etc.; silver napkin rings or eating utensils.

And don't forget candies, fruit and other "eats!"

Horn, pillow for bed or carriage, booties or moccasins, teething ring, teddy bear, gold pins, brush and comb, silver rattle, high chair, magic lantern, pencil set.

**For the Ladies**

Jewellery—Pearl necklace, gold and platinum bar pin, set with diamonds, ring set with jewels, gold or silver gem-set, wrist watch, earrings, ornaments, jewelled powder compact, vanity cases, costume jewellery.

Silver—Tea set, flower vase, candlesticks, toilet articles, mesh bag, vanity jar, photo frame, dresser clock.

Ivory—Toilet set, dresser clock, ornament.

Electric gifts—Chafing dish, curling set, reading lamp, floor lamp, heater, coffee percolator, toaster, grill, waffle iron, hair dryer, clock.

Wearables—Lingerie, pyjamas, gloves, scarf, sweater, boudoir cushions, hosiery, handkerchiefs, silk step-ins and vest, fabric gloves, evening wrap, fancy garters, corsage bouquet, dressing gown, ostrich corsage, georgette scarf, Spanish shawl, French negligee, opera cloak.

Sports wear—Sweater coat, golf knickers, sleighing, tobogganing or skating outfit; scarf, toque and gloves to match; hosiery, winter hiking costume.

Toilet articles—Manicule set, bobbed hair comb, perfume, brush, comb, hand mirror.

Leather goods—Hat box, under-arm bag, overnight case, vanity case, club bag, writing case, wardrobe trunk, glove case, slippers, gloves.

Outdoor sports—Golf clubs, walking stick with folding seat; figure, hockey or racing skates, toboggan equipment, skiing equipment, snowshoes.

Furnishings—Boudoir rug bridge table, bookcase, pictures, love seat, cedar chest, dressing table.

Sport roadster or coupe motor car, boudoir set, books, umbrella or parasol, dancing slippers, fountain pen and pencil set, magazine or newspaper subscription, fancy neckwear, book ends, set of scissors, perfume atomizer, embroidered shawl.

Flowers, opera glasses, camera, thermos bottle, books on hobbies, jewelled fan, season ticket to hockey games, folding umbrella, boudoir ornaments, five-pound box of chocolates, lounging pyjamas, fur coat, stationery, silver or gold thimble, bath salts and bath dusting powder. Fancy coat hangers or shoe trees, fruit knife, silver-plated tea ball, copper kettle, musical powder boxes and dressing seats.
