Well-Known Barrister and Military Man of the North Passes Away at his Home in Elk Lake on Friday of Last Week

Col. H. E. McKee, widely-known barrister, of Elk Lake, died at his home at Elk Lake on Friday of last week, Dec. 16th, following a lengthy illness. The late Col. McKee was in his 67th year. The funeral was held on Monday of this week.

Col. McKee was one of the best known and most highly-esteemed of the early residents of the North. He was noted for his enterprise and his generosity and for many years was a leading figure in the life of the
