Rain Falls Christmas Eve in This North Land

Timmins had a rather rare occurrence on the Christmas Eve just past when a heavy rain fell for two or three hours. The rain commenced about 5 p.m. Christmas Eve and continued in showers the greater part of the evening. It is not often that there is rain at Christmas time in Timmins, but there was considerable of it Saturday night. The experience of Timmins was fairly general throughout the North. Most of the snow was taken away by the warm rain and rivers and lakes that had been frozen over were no longer available for skating. The rain Saturday night proved a considerable handicap to business. There had been a splendid trade at practically every store until the advent of the rain. Then all who could do so remained comfortably at home. Of course, those who braved the weather, were actually out for buying not for window shopping. Later in the evening the rain ceased. If the rain proved bad for business, it was favourable to the prevalent "flu", many cases developing over the holiday and in several cases whole families being laid up by the disease. Better weather this week will no doubt help to decrease the number of new cases.
