East Geduld Mines Give Profit to Dome

Dividend Announcement by South African Concern will be of Interest to All, and Especially to Those Concerned in the Dome Mines.

The recent announcement of an 81 per cent, dividend by East Geduld Mines, on the far East Rand, has served to swell the income of Dame Mines, since this company owns 90,000 shares, purchased at a cost of \$1,107,117 in 1931. As the East Geduld shares are one pound par value, Dome's dividend cheque was approximately \$38,250. East Geduld made an initial dividend disbursement on July 26, 1932, of five per cent., enriching Dome's coffers by some \$21,600.

The recent market flurry in gold mines shares has not been confined to Canada alone and current quotations show East Geduld selling at around 90 shillings per share or about \$17 in Canadian funds. Dome's cost was about \$12.30 per share.



Tells Experiences in the Barren Lands

Bert Airth Tells Toronto Audience Trip 1,200 Miles from Moose Factory in July of 1931.

Trials and tribulations of prospecting in the barren lands of the upper east coast of Hudson Bay were portrayed by W. B. Airth, Toronto mining engineer, in an illustrated address to members of the Toronto branch Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy, and of the Ontario Prospectors' Association in the Royal York hotel recently.

Leaving Moose Factory in July 1931 Mr. Airth travelled by canoe with three companions 1,200 miles up the east coast to Cape Smith. A camp, erected from materials brought around through Hudson's Straits by the famous northern steamship "Ungava," was built and supplies and fuel for a year's operations assembled.

During the late winter months caches of the month in the Oddfellows hall were established with the aid of native Eskimos and dog teams for a distance of over 100 miles inland, along the strike of a long belt of greenstones.
