The Bugs Have Bitten
Some weeks ago this column drew attention in an educational manner to the various bugs and other members of the coterie class which infested the troops during the Great War. This proved very enlightening to most of the returned soldiers and also a large number of civilians who read their column weekly. The articles then went on to show that the natural history lesson could also be applied to the work of the present-day Communist activities among the returned men. It was shown that the "Cimex Brothers" and all their tribe could if allowed time to breed their disloyal teachings, create quite a problem for the law-abiding citizens to handle. Recent events prove without doubt that the crawling and worming beings have secured possession of a number of veterans and there being no de-lousing plants in Toronto the "Bugs" are having a merry time. In a nutshell the facts are these:—A communist meeting was raided by the police one afternoon a week or so ago, where force and violence was preached as a means to attain Red demands. 45 men were arrested. These consisted of the two leaders, five foreigners and thirty-eight veterans of the Great War. Some will say, "they were just there out of curiosity." Not so! The meeting was called, so investigation has proven, by the passing of word of mouth, one to another. Would a patriotic or clear-thinking citizen have received that message? For one think not. Then again when all were taken to court evidence showed that a great number were known to the police as trouble-makers and another fact was that all were on civic relief. It was stated that several similar meetings had been held and that very afternoon there were quite a number in progress also. All except the two leaders were charged as vagrants and were unable to secure the necessary bail. The two breeders of disloyalty will be charged under the Criminal Code governing cases of inciting to use force and violence. There is conclusive proof that the Reds are leaving no stone unturned to spread their evil propaganda among the unemployed veterans and existing conditions are making their work easy. What are the returned soldier organizations doing in the matter? Are they going to let things go on as they are, or are they going to try a way to bring these lost comrades back to the road of clear thinking? One way suggests itself and that is for all returned soldier organizations to start a campaign on a big scale, telling one and all the true facts of the propaganda of these Soviet agents. There are some who will say, "Well, there were only 38 veterans arrested. Why worry over that?" But when it is figured there were only 45 at the meeting the percentage runs very high, indeed, and this was only one meeting out of many. One very interesting point of it all was the manner in which the Toronto police acted. It was found that these men had not eaten for a considerable time. Diocese of Moosonee is Among Those Benefitted

Continuance of Anglican missionary work in the six dioceses of the ecclesiastical province of Rupert's Land, jeopardized by the loss of episcopal endowments and other funds, is assured for the next three years through the generosity of agents of the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada (including the woman's clergy throughout the Dominion).
Within a few weeks after the establishment of the Episcopal and Clerical Special Maintenance Fund to provide the interest on the lost endowments, the amount of approximately \$90,000, estimated to be necessary to carry on the work for the next three years, has been almost pledged.
In the meantime the appeal of the Restoration Fund Committee for the replacement in full of the endowments, totalling some \$760,000 by the laity of the church, will be made in April.
The dioceses of Rupert's Land, Moose-nee, Keewatin, Athabasca, Mackenzie River and Yukon benefit through the Episcopal and Clerical Special Maintenance Fund.
Agents of the M. S. C. C. are contributing seven per cent. of their salaries to the fund while the contributions of the bishops and clergy are voluntary.

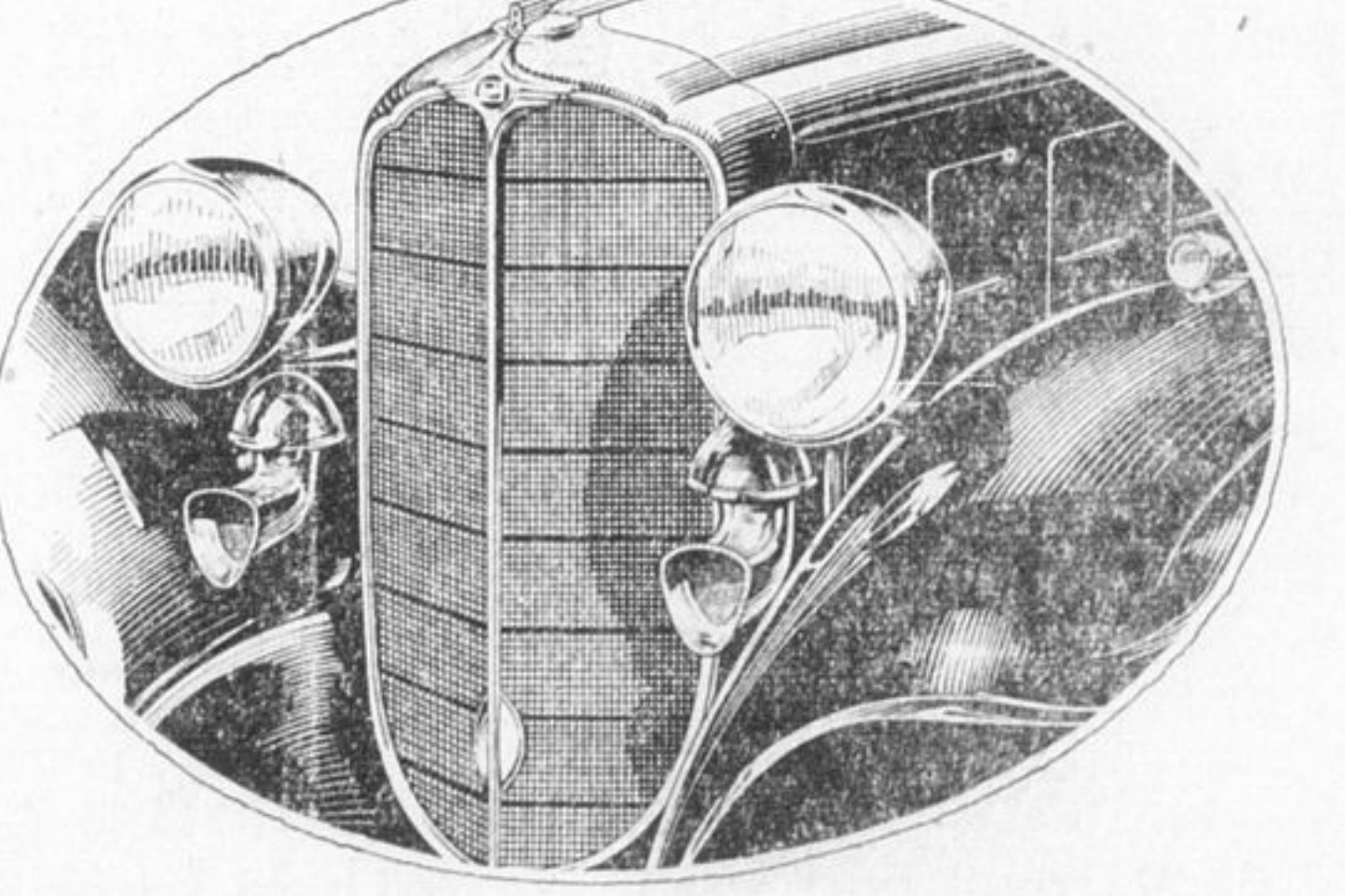

Noteworthy Achievements in Advertising of Oxo
