some of the landlords who were unable to collect their rents. It was a serious hardship for some. Some tenants were behind several months. Councillor Massie said that he had one house for which the family occupying it were behind a full year. "I'd think I was lucky if I had a landlord like that," commented a man in the audience, who added that they were hotfoot after him if he got a month behind. Councillor Honey suggested that this recommendation might be referred back to the committee for further consideration. This was agreed to. Councillor Morrison thought it might be a good idea if

the whole council were to have a conference with the relief committee. It was explained that under the Timmins Relief Fund plan all relief was administered by the town's relief department as before. The money collected under the One Day's Pay campaign was being turned over to the town, the Timmins Relief Fund committee acting in advisory capacity and helping investigate cases. The Timmins Relief Fund committee was composed of representatives of the Kiwanis Club, three members of the town council, the town clerk, the relief officer, and representatives of the Hollinger Mine and men. The council members of the committee invited the mayor and all the other councillors to attend the next meeting of the Timmins Relief Fund committee at the Empire hotel on Wednesday of this week at 4 p.m.
