Eating of Whole Wheat on the Increase in Canada

The increasing popularity of whole wheat foods is, according to some medical authorities, one of the most commendable dietetic trends of today. Strong Committees Appealing for Funds

Diocesan Workers Organize to Replace Lost Endowments of the Anglican Province of Rupert's Land.

Intensive activity in the various Anglican dioceses in Canada has resulted from the appeal of the Executive Council of the General Synod of the Church to prevent discontinuance of missionary enterprise in the province of Rupert's Land.

In a number of dioceses strong committees have been formed in response to the appeal of the Restoration Fund Committee to raise \$700,000 to replace the lost endowments of the middle western province while organization work is proceeding rapidly in the other dioceses.

Reports indicate that the committees already working in the dioceses of Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Huron and Rupert's Land are meeting with considerable success as they appeal to the various congregations in their districts.

Bishop J. C. Farthing is honorary chairman of the Montreal Diocesan Committee with R. J. Magor as chairman. Others on the committee include Lt.-Col. Herbert Molson, J. E. Macpherson, and Lady Drummond.

Mr. A. B. Whitehead is chairman of the Quebec Diocesan Committee.

The Ottawa Committee organized a large meeting at the Capitol theatre on Sunday, February 19th, which was attended by over 1400 people. General Winter is chairman and other members include Col. McLenaghan, Chancellor Gilshorne, Sir George Perley, Sir Robert Borden, Sir Percy Sherwood and Mrs. J. A. Wilson.

The appeal in Toronto diocese is being made by an active body of workers headed by Bishop D. T. Owen and Sir Henry Drayton, while the women's section is headed by Mrs. H. D. Warren.

In Huron diocese a large and representative committee is at work with Mr. Walker Whiteside and Judge Morley as chairman and vice-chairman and Archdeacon Doherty as general secretary. Bishop Seager is chairman of the executive with Col. Ellis and Col. Carling as vice-chairmen.

In Niagara diocese Mr. J. P. Bell is chairman and Mr. T. H. Simpson vice-chairman with Mrs. Leather in charge of the women's section.

In Nova Scotia Mr. D. M. Owen is honorary chairman with Mr. F. S. A. Bowman, chairman and Chancellor R. V. Harris and Mr. A. E. Nash as members.

In Rupert's Land another enthusiastic committee has been formed with Archbishop Stringer as honorary chairman and Dr. W. Harvey Smith as chairman. Other members of the committee include W. C. Blake and R. R. Pattinson.

The Restoration Fund Committee's appeal culminates late in April when an "every member canvass" will be made in all Anglican congregations throughout Canada.

Premier Says Relief Not as Good as Work

But Costs Less. Seats to be Reduced to 90 or Less. Other Matters at the Session of the Ontario Legislature.

A slashing attack was delivered by Premier Henry, in the Ontario Legislature during the debate on the Speech from the Throne, upon H. C. Nixon, Progressive Leader, when the Premier charged the Progressive with attempting to take from him his honour and integrity.

Premier Henry was defending his directorship with the Toronto Mortgage Company, in charging that Mr. Nixon was not a man who had the right to place his impression upon the province that the Premier was untrue to his trust, but as "the sole surviving member of an administration (the Drury regime) that had done more damage to the good name of Ontario than anything else in history."

Premier Henry challenged Mr. Nixon's statements on the issue as a deliberate policy of innuendo.

"I wonder," asked the Premier of Mr. Nixon, "if my honorable friend has ever heard of cabinet responsibility and if so if he appreciates what it means? I remember one of his colleagues got into trouble and Premier Drury tried to get away from it but was forced to admit that he, as head of the Government of the day, was responsible for the acts of his colleagues and his administration—forced to admit, too, that all his colleagues were besmirched."

Premier Henry in closing the incident quoted from the bard of Avon's lines: "who steals my purse steals trash—'tis something, nothing, but he that pilfers from me my good name, robs me of that which no enriches him but leaves me poor indeed."

In further defending his actions, Premier Henry declared there had never been any secret as to his position with his company, it having been published in biographical books, while he also declared that he had more money invested in his own farm than in anything else he owns.

The Premier commended the people of the province for the co-operation they have shown in connection with unemployment relief, while he also paid compliment to W. E. N. Sinclair, K.C., Opposition-Liberal Leader, and Hon. James Lyons, who had accepted offices as mayor of Oshawa and Sault Ste. Marie respectively, assuming great responsibilities during present conditions.

For a three month period in 1932-33 the province and the Dominion each contributed \$2,750,000 and the municipalities \$2,000,000 a total of \$7,500,000, and a total for the period starting 1930-31 to Feb. 1 this year for both direct and indirect relief of \$61,500,000.

"Direct relief is costing us less but is not as satisfactory as giving work," declared Premier Henry. "The vast majority of those on relief would far sooner take low wages and have the consciousness and pride of earning money for themselves and their families. But that could not be done and so we fell back on a system of direct relief."

Discussing the proposed redistribution bill, Premier Henry said the decision had been to reduce the Legislature from 112 seats to at least 90 or less. While the problem holds many difficulties that will be worked out by the special committee which will deal with the problem.

Dealing with the Hydro report, the Premier pointed out that the senior member of the judiciary, Mr. Justice Riddell had never been connected with the Conservative party, but had been the choice for the inquiry commission by a Liberal newspaper. He also made the statement that the statement regarding Hydro reserve being \$62,500,000 as mentioned in the Speech from the Throne are all there, declaring that Hydro stands to the credit of the chairman and his predecessors that during the past eight years nearly all of these reserves have been built up. In regard to education costs, Premier Henry intimated that school boards will be directed to cut to the bone, while the government is firm to reduce provincial grants for education by 20 p.c.

Hon. Wm. Finlayson, Minister of Lands and Forests, introduced Legislation under the Northern Development Act whereby authority will be given to write off long-standing debts against properties in the North upon which the back-to-the-land committee located settlers last year.

Argue Martin, (Cons.) West Hamilton, introduced a measure to prevent discrimination against any race, class or religious sect in publishing such information or displaying it, while Hon. Charles McCrea, Minister of Mines, introduced an amendment to the Mining Act in respect to the staking of claims, partnership and fees.

A measure that is likely to come before the House from certain municipalities is a request for permission to increase the present business tax on chain stores. The present tax is 25 p.c. on a percentage of the assessed value, while the request is to double this tax.

In continuing the debate on the Throne Speech, A. V. Waters, (Cons.), North Cochrane, informed the legislature that unless regulations covering doctor's fees for relief cases in the North are changed, a number of the people will die for lack of necessary operations Mr. Waters also asked that relief matters in the North be handed over to the Department of Northern Development for administration. He also asked an inquiry into the colonization scheme as it operates in the North. J. P. Strickland, (Cons.),

Peterboro City, criticized the lack of control over school boards' expenditures, while he commended the government's move to extend the Mortgage and Purchasers legislation to give relief to those who find themselves in difficulties.

Geo. Shields, (Cons.), Woodbine-Toronto, introduced the measure passed by the City of Toronto Council which seeks to place a super-tax on incomes on a grading percentage over \$10,000.

Hon. Geo. H. Chalmers, Minister of Game and Fisheries, announced before the committee on game and fisheries that elk from Alberta will be located in an enclosure on the property at Burwash Reformatory in the North. Dates upon which various hunters and anglers are to be heard by the committee are to be left to the chairman, Geo. W. Ecclestone, Muskoka.

A house committee was appointed to consider the best means of preparing the voters lists, under the chairmanship of Premier Henry, and comprising eight other members who will report back to the house this session.

Another of Those False Rumours Peddled Here

There was a story around town during the week-end to the effect that a Timmins business man who with his wife is at present down south on a holiday, had been kidnapped and was being held for ransom. Those telling this story when questioned as to how and where they had heard it, would reply to the effect that it came over the radio. They could also give circumstantial details about the kidnapping and the causes that led up to it. One of these stories was to the effect that the Timmins business man had made a big win on a horse race event in Florida and that this had attracted the attention of a gang of crooks who had waylaid him and were holding him for a large ransom. There were some people who were deceived enough by the plausible stories told that they were beginning to feel sorry for the kidnapers who would have found out that they had kidnapped the sort of man who would be difficult to hold and who would make things mighty lively and uncomfortable for kidnapers. Of course, there was no truth, whatever.

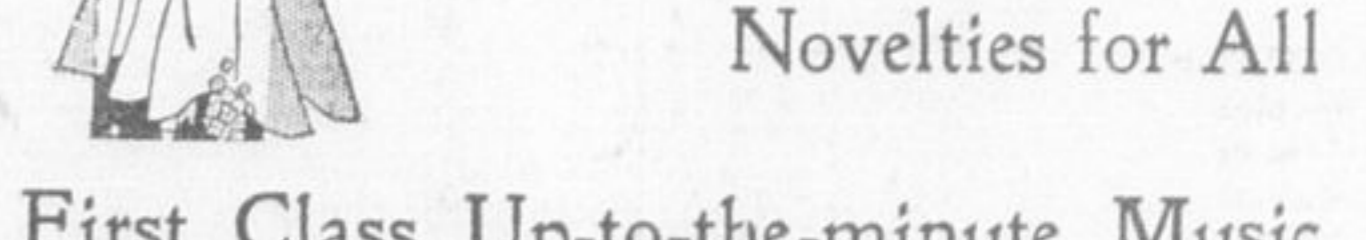
