Enquiry Being Made Into Death of Man at Cobalt

Alleged to have been the victim of a drinking bout, Pete Bigras, a married man resident in Cobalt, was found dead in a Russell street house at Cobalt late on Friday evening. The police are investigating the case, though an inquest is not considered necessary, the cause of death being apparent as due to natural causes. One of the tenants of the house found Bigras lying against a trunk from which he had apparently fallen. The other tenant was also in the house, lying on the bed in what appeared to be a drunken stupor. The police were notified, and it was found that Bigras had been dead several hours when discovered. Two other men had been to the house earlier in the evening, the police learned, but no liquor was found in the place though there were some empty bottles. Bigras had been seriously hurt in an accident at Abitibi Canyon some time ago and relatives said that recently he had been drinking rubbing alcohol. The man who was drunk in the house when the dead body of Bigras was discovered was placed under arrest, but later was released.

Allan Orr, of Cobalt, nephew of W. W. Orr, of Timmins, was the winner Monday night of the annual oratory contest at Cobalt high school, and will go to North Bay to-morrow night to compete in the district oratory competition. TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance files.

It was the sad duty of The Advance ten years ago to record the death of Philip Dahar on February 28th, 1923, after a brief illness. He was the third son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Dahar, Timmins, and was less than sixteen years of age at the time of death. He was born in Cobalt and came to Timmins with the family in 1911. He was highly regarded as a gentlemanly young fellow of more than usual ability. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in the camp. Rev. R. S. Cushing conducted the services at St. Matthew's Anglican church. The pallbearers were members of the Timmins Cadets, of which Philip was first lieutenant here for some time. The Cadets attended the funeral in a body. In addition to the bereaved parents, Philip was survived by four brothers, Morris, Harry, Almen and Eddie, and two sisters, Mrs. M. David (Mary), of Cochrane, and Miss Sadie, at home.

Four lads were arrested here ten years ago charged with over twenty robberies. They were sentenced to terms varying with their part in the crimes. A large amount of goods was recovered through the good work of Chief Greer and Deputy Chief M. Salley. The young men had several caches around town and had carried on their evil work in rather systematic way. The lads ranged in age from 16 to 19 years.

Ten years ago the Sault hockey team defeated Timmins on the local ice here with a score of 9 to 3. Sault Ste. Marie thus won by a wide margin on the round, easily capturing the N.O.H.A. honours for the season. Commenting on the game The Advance said:—"The best team won. It takes a good team to trim Timmins. And that's the Sault." The Sault put up a better game than at the Sault the previous Thursday evening. Scully was not lucky in goal and was replaced by Baridon who played a splendid game. Fournier, not being fully recovered from an attack of the "flu," did not play his usual game. Reis was the hero of the evening for Timmins and on more than one occasion brought the Sault goalie to his knees to save. Don Campbell and Bill Cameron played a notable game and Doc Behan was also very valuable for Timmins. McGuire worked hard but had an offnight for luck with his shots. Roach was a particular hard worker during the evening and kept the visitors earning everything they got. In concluding a lengthy report of the game The Advance said:—"It is only honest to admit frankly that the Sault team outlasted the local team from practically every angle."

The line-up for Timmins was as follows:—goal, Scully, Baridon; left, Reis; right, Fournier; centre, McGuire; wings, Cameron, Behan; subs., Campbell, Roach. The line-up for Sault Ste. Marie will be of almost equal interest. Goal, Walsh; defence, Donnelly, Brown; centre, Phillips; wings, Woodruff, Lesard; subs., Fahey, Campbell.

Timmins Girls' Hockey team won the Madame Anson cup and the championship of the North by defeating Ironquois Falls at the Falls with the score of 2 to 0. Timmins line-up was as follows:—Gertie Poulin, goal; C. Taylor and L. McCarthy, defence; Nellie Studor, Fern McCarthy and Mary Downey, forwards; Agnes Agrignon and Miss Leblanc, spares.

The Advance announced ten years ago that the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines had been granted rights on the Abitibi river for the development of power at Island Falls.

Ten years ago there was a very busy session of the Timmins board of trade with many important questions being dealt with. T. F. King, the newly-elected president occupied the chair and kept everything going along smoothly. Some of the questions brought up at the meeting may be summarized as follows:—"Attention was drawn to the poor restaurant service on the T. & N. O. There was no complaint regarding the restaurant at Porquus Junction, but both Englehart and Temagami came in for many left-handed compliments. In view of the fact that there was no diner or buffet car on the Toronto-Timmins train, the restaurant service was very important to the travelling public. Both the quality of the food and the prices charged at Englehart and Temagami were objected to, but emphasis was particularly made to the poor tea and coffee service. "If the restaurant would specialize on serving a real good cup of tea or coffee, it would certainly help a lot." Mr. J. E. Newton suggested. It was decided to have the secretary write the T. & N. O. Commission calling their attention to the matter and urging improvement. A discussion also took place regarding the post office service in Timmins, during which Fire Chief Borland directed attention to the recent increase in box rents. The boxes here were costing four times the rental the Government charged for the same service in Cobalt. He said that the postmaster here claimed that the increase was absolutely necessary to make the office pay, and Chief Borland thought that if this were the case the Government should take this office out of the commission class and put it on the same basis as the Cobalt one. The general accommodations at the post office here were touched upon, and eventually it was decided to take the whole question up at the next meeting of the board. It was suggested that the postmaster be invited to this next meeting. The idea of the board of trade was to secure the very best possible service and accommodation at the local post office for the benefit of the public, and in this the co-operation of the postmaster would be of much assistance. Another local service to be discussed was the telephone service. The general feeling of the meeting was that the local staffs did the best possible with the equipment, but that the service was inadequate and a cause of so much profanity. Reference was made to the improved service given for some weeks before the renewal of the franchise, and it was suggested that the staffs be increased again to make at least this improvement possible once more. The service was not keeping up with the growth and needs of the town, and the general opinion was that the company should make material addition and improvements to the equipment. With a view to securing an improvement in the telephone service, it was decided to ask the town council to see what steps may be taken under the franchise agreement to assure better service generally.

There has always been the school problem here—not enough room for all the pupils. Another evidence of this may be gathered from the following from The Advance of March 1st, 1923:—"Tenders are being called for the furnishing of labour and materials for the erection of a new ten-room separate school building for Timmins. The new separate school is to be built in Matagamag section of the town and it is expected that active work in the construction will be started as soon as the spring opens, the building to be pushed forward to completion in time for the school opening in the fall or soon thereafter. The new separate school will be of steel and tile construction and will follow the most approved lines of modern school building construction."

There were two marriage notices in The Advance ten years ago, the couples in each case being well known and very popular with wide circles of friends in the district. Under the heading, "Popular Couple Married at Timmins Last Wednesday," The Advance of March 1st, 1923, said:—"Wednesday evening of last week Wm. King and Miss Ethel Brown were married at the R.C. Rectory by Rev. Fr. Theriault. Mr. O. D. King was groomsmen and Miss Klelah Brown was bridesmaid. Mr. King who has been for a number of years a popular member of the Hollinger Mine staff, and the bride who has been some years the efficient and popular chief operator of the Porcupine Telephone Lines at Timmins, will receive the very heartiest good wishes from their hosts of friends in the district."

The other wedding referred to took place at Cobalt, the groom being a popular Timmins young man. Under the heading, "Mr. T. M. Davis Married at Cobalt on Monday," The Advance said:—"Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Kelly, of Craigmont, Ont., announce the marriage of their daughter, Harriet Audrey, to Mr. Thomas MacLean Davis, of Timmins, the event taking place at Cobalt on March 5th. Mr. and Mrs. Davis will take up residence in Timmins and will be at home to friends here after April 2nd. The bride has been living at Cobalt where she has hosts of friends, while the groom has been one of the popular young men of Timmins for some years past. The young couple will have sincere good wishes of their many friends in the North Land."

Still another wedding noted in The Advance ten years ago took place at St. Matthew's rectory, Timmins, when Joseph Alton Kenny, provincial police officer stationed at Cochrane, and Miss Agnes Adeline Reise, of Cochrane, were united in marriage, by Rev. R. S. Cushing. Miss Esther R. Reise, sister of the bride, was bridesmaid, and Eric G. Reise, at that time the clever defence man on the Timmins hockey team, supported the groom. Mr. and Mrs. Kenny returned to Cochrane to reside.

Special mention was made by The Advance ten years ago to the visit of Ralph Dipaolo, of the Golden City board of trade to a meeting of the Timmins board of trade. In this connection, The Advance said:—"Mr. R. Dipaolo, of the Golden City board of trade was present and was asked to address the meeting. Mr. Dipaolo suggested that Timmins, South Porcupine, Schumacher and Golden City boards of trade might work together for matters of general interest. One question that he brought to notice was the unreliability of the T. & N. O. in regard to supplying freight cars. This was a serious matter to lumbermen, settlers and others, as it often meant serious loss and inconvenience through men and teams being held idle waiting on freight cars. He thought that sometimes it looked as if partiality was shown in the allotment of cars and he gave instances where this appeared to be the case. United action by the four boards of trade on this branch might assist in bettering conditions in this and other matters. Mr. Dipaolo was assured of the co-operation of Timmins board of trade in every matter for the advantage of the district. He was told that the questions he brought forward would be studied and suitable action taken as soon as possible."

The Advance ten years ago said:—"Mrs. Henry Huot passed away at her home in South Porcupine on Monday evening of this week after an illness of only two or three days. Death was due to pneumonia. The late Mrs. Huot had been a highly-esteemed resident of South Porcupine for some seven or eight years past and her death will be deeply regretted by all who knew her. In addition to the bereaved husband two small children are left to mourn her loss, and to these sincere sympathy of all will be extended."

The sixth anniversary of the Brynes Presbyterian church, of Timmins, now ten years ago, Sunday, March 4th, 1923, to be exact. In referring to the occasion, The Advance said:—"On Sunday morning and evening the Timmins Presbyterian church was crowded to capacity and beyond for the special services observing the sixth anniversary of the church here. The attendance at the evening service was particularly large, and the services were appreciated by all. Rev. J. D. Farks occupied the pulpit at both services, and his addresses were most interesting and inspiring. The event of the anniversary was made the occasion for the showing of appreciation and honour to the pioneers of this part of the North Land, and Rev. Mr. Farks was particularly effective in the lessons he emphasized from the example of the lives of courage and character of the old-timers. Special music by the choir added to the attractiveness of the services."

Among the local and personal items in The Advance ten years ago were the following:—"Friends will deeply regret to know of the serious illness of the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Heppleston." "There will be general regret at the illness of Mrs. C. B. Morgan, South Porcupine, and wishes are sincere for her sure and early recovery." "Born—At the Cairns hospital, Timmins, on Friday, March 2nd, 1923, to Mr. and Mrs. B. Moffat, Crown Mine—a daughter." "Mr. W. G. Smith is on the sick list. His hosts of friends here will sincerely wish Bill a speedy and complete recovery." "Born—At Cairns hospital, Timmins, on Sunday, March 4th to Mr. and Mrs. F. Gardiner, of South Porcupine—a son." "Well, anyway, no outside team can win the championship of the Mines Hockey League." "Mr. John W. Fogg returned last week from a visit to the West. Mrs. Fogg is also home again after a visit to Portland, Maine." "No, Cecil, it is not true that a local clergyman recently preached from the text, "Of the opening of drug stores there is no end. There is no such text in any of the ordinary bibles." "Mr. Sol. Shankman is back from an extended visit to Montreal where he went for medical treatment. His numerous friends are pleased to see him back with health apparently restored." "According to The North Bay Nugget, the bandana, which is being worn so much in larger centres, has arrived in North Bay as a new fashion in headwear. There is a large section of North Bay where the red bandana has been the fashionable headwear for many years past." "In the pony contest at Kirkland Lake recently, someone named the pony "Spark Plug," and the name stuck. Lennis McCoy, of Swastika, won "Spark Plug" with over two million votes, the next nearest competitor being 700,000 behind." "Mr. Jas. Grant, of Kirkland Lake, spent the week-end in town." "Those interested in a public library for Timmins will be pleased to learn that the matter has been taken up again by the town council. Last year a by-law was submitted to the ratepayers and carried regarding the town's financial support of the public library, but after the matter gradually dropped from attention."
