Annual Meeting of the Children's Aid

Officers Re-elected for the District of Cochrane Children's Aid Society. Superintendent's Report Shows Year of Progress and Good Work.

The annual meeting of the District of Cochrane Children's Aid Society was held in the C.A.S. Shelter, Timmins, on Friday evening last, March 10th, with a representative attendance from the district. The president of the Iroquois Falls and Ansonville branch of the C.A.S. was unable to be present, but the Iroquois Falls and Ansonville branch was represented by J. W. Regimball, secretary, and Mrs. Regimball, one of the vice-presidents of the branch. Mrs. Marwick, president of the Cochrane branch of the C.A.S., was present to represent that branch. Others present included Rev. Bruce Millar, E. L. Longmore, Miss Richer, and others.

The report of the secretary and superintendent for the year ending Oct. 31st, 1932, was read and approved. This report will be found elsewhere in this issue. In moving the adoption of this report, appreciation was expressed for the good work done by the local superintendent, A. G. Carson, and by the matron of the Shelter, Mrs. E. M. Condie; also to Mrs. G. H. Gauthier for the beautifying of the Shelter grounds, and to the town nurses, Miss Brooks and Miss Richer, and the V.O.N. nurse, Miss Barlow, for interest and kindness in helping look after the health of the children at the Shelter. Appreciation was also expressed for all those mentioned in the report as helping on the work. The report was adopted on motion of E. L. Longmore, seconded by J. W. Regimball.

The auditor's report for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31st, 1932, was read and adopted on motion of E. L. Longmore and Rev. Bruce Millar. The following is a summary of the auditor's report:

Disbursements—salaries, \$3,048.67; travelling expenses, \$370.60; general office expenses, \$328.05; provisions for Shelter, \$1,767.92; general maintenance and relief, \$1,732.35; light and fuel, \$349.94; hospital and medicine, \$86.24; clothing, \$275.00; bank interest on notes \$23.25; paid note to bank owing Oct. 31st, 1931, \$400.00; total disbursements, \$8,866.68; balance on hand per bank book, \$116.65. Total, \$8,983.31.

The secretary also read a list of all the accounts due as at March 1st, 1933, these totalling \$3,033.96. Against these there were accounts collectable from the township of Calvert, township of Tisdale, province of Ontario, etc., together with a bank balance at date of \$381.23, making a total of \$1,720.33, and leaving a deficit of \$1,313.63. The deficit, it was explained was due to the fact that no campaign had been put on last year for funds, and that a campaign would wipe out the deficit and allow the society to carry on. The last campaign put on a year and a half ago had been successful, and the finances were in better shape than at the last annual meeting, despite additional calls.

On motion the officers for 1933 were re-elected for 1933, with the exception of Mrs. Stevens as vice-president, her place being taken by Mrs. Marwick, president of the Cochrane C.A.S. The following are the officers as elected:—
