At the police court on Tuesday three drunks paid the usual fine, also one speeder was fined. For being illegally in possession of an otter skin a man paid \$20.00 and costs (\$38.50), and also had four fine fox skins confiscated for not having the proper holding permit. The charge was laid by Game Warden Eddlestone who discovered the skins in the man's cabin while he was out on his trap lines. A claim of having liquor in a public place was dismissed and another similar charge adjourned. The main time was taken up with a stabbing case against Anna Bertoli, of Schumacher, who it is alleged cut Mrs. Erminia Fizzali across the face with a razor on the evening of March 30th in Schumacher. It took seventeen stitches to close the wound which reached from the ear to the upper lip, and the case had been adjourned on former occasions to wait until the injured woman was recovered enough to give testimony. Mr. Dean Kester appeared on behalf of Mrs. Bertoli while Mr. Cummings, solicitor, of Haileybury, was present in the interests of the Pizzalis. The woman was committed for trial at the assizes being held at Cochrane in June. Mrs. Pizzali, during the preliminary hearing, stated that while she was in conversation with two Italian friends on the street across from Dr. Byers on the stated evening, the accused came from across the street and reaching from behind drew the razor across her face. The other two Italians would not swear that it was Mrs. Bertoli that did it as all they had seen was the arm and hand reach out with something in it. The trouble seemed to have started some years ago. While Mrs. Bertoli was in Italy with her children, witness (Mrs. Pizzali) stated that the husband had come to her with a book in which he asked her to write a declaration that she had seen the accused kissing another Italian who was boarding there. Magistrate Atkinson objected to the introduction of this evidence without producing the book. Lawyer Kester insisted that he was right as it was a case of cross-questioning a witness of the crown. The magistrate over-ruled him as it had happened so long ago (three years) that it was not fair to the witness. The case was held over until a messenger was sent to get the book. In the meantime Dr. Byers told of the woman being brought to his place for attention. Constable Fulton also told of a phone call from the Gold Range hotel and on his arrival there of the woman, Mrs. Bertoli, then in a very hysterical condition, giving herself up fearing the wounded woman might be killed. On a resumption of the trial the book was produced and the witness Mrs. E. Pizzali, admitted the writing. There was a clash between the court interpreter D. 


