On Winnipeg being reached he was rushed to the St. Boniface hospital, but he died shortly after being admitted.

Col. Drum was in Timmins as recently as April 7th and 8th, when he was testing the Hollinger and McIntyre First Aid teams. This was Col. Drum's first visit to Timmins.

E. L. Longmore took him on a tour around the town and district and pointed out the various points of interest. Col. Drum was greatly surprised at the size of some of the buildings in town, especially the schools and the hospital.

The permanent type of buildings impressed him particularly. He commented on the permanent and modern type of structures in town, remarking the idea he had been given before visiting here was that Timmins was simply a mining camp and he expected to see only a few mines and a lot of wooden buildings, instead of the permanent structures that are here.
