Why Expect Public Thought for Roads?

With the Attitude of the Ontario Government Announced as Being to let Roads in North go to Ruin, Why Look to the Public for Better Sense?

Governments are always expected to give leadership and example to the public and when they cease to do so the people usually think it high time to replace them. In the past, however, with the possible exception of the Farmers' Government the administrations in Ontario even at their worst have shown some judgment and regard for affairs so that the different administrations may truthfully be said to have given an example to the people.

In the district newspapers last week there were the usual reports of early trips over the Ferguson highway and other roads in the North. There were the suggestions of boasts for being the first to go by motor from one place to another. There were touching tales of trucks and cars being stalled in this strip of road or in that. All these incidents deserve condemnation.

Timmins Kiwanis Second in February Attendance

Timmins Kiwanis Club took second place in February in attendance among the clubs of the Ontario-Quebec-Maritime district. There are forty-six clubs in the report published in the current issue of K-Ray, the official publication of Kiwanis. Orilla heads the list with an attendance percentage of 92.8, while Timmins is second with 90.18 per cent.

Predicts Big Increase in Employment Very Shortly

Envisaging a betterment in conditions within the next six months through the decisive action now being taken by President Roosevelt and in view of the impending World Economic Conference, Hon. Charles McCrea, Ontario Minister of Mines, at Toronto on Thursday night last week painted a vivid picture of the part the gold mining industry is playing in meeting Canada's obligations.

"I am confident that 60 per cent. of the unemployed persons here will be employed within six months," he told his audience of 500 persons. Ontario produced gold valued at \$47,000,000 last year, he declared, and production was increasing by leaps and bounds. He predicted that the mining industry would be in the forefront of a return to better conditions.

Business will not reach a satisfactory basis until the debt question is settled, he declared. Currency must also be established on a common yardstick, he affirmed.

Replying to a questioner, Mr. McCrea agreed that Canada was over-governed and outlined the provincial government's action in reducing the membership of the Legislature by 20 per cent. He believed that the governments were giving full consideration to the question of reducing interest rates on loans.

Announces Dissolution of German Masonic Lodges

According to the cable despatches last week from Berlin, dissolution of all Free Masonic lodges in Germany and their reformation on a "purely Christian basis" was announced on Tuesday evening last week by the National Grand Lodges. The word "Free Mason" will be held temporarily, as will the ritual based on the Old Testament, after which they are likely to disappear, it was decided.

The lodges will be reorganized under the name "National Christian Order of Friedrich the Great." Jews will not be permitted to join the new order.

A statement said that "in deference to the times" the Grand Lodges had decided upon the step. This sweeps away Masonic tradition almost 200 years old in Germany. The first lodge was established in Hamburg in 1737, and the second in Berlin the following year. Berlin's "Grandmother Lodge of Three Worlds" was founded by Friedrich the Great.

Ontario Prospectors at Annual Dinner on Friday

Confined strictly to prospectors and mining men, the annual dinner of the Ontario Prospectors' Association held at Toronto on Friday evening last at the Royal York hotel will go down as a milestone in the industry itself. Widely attended, and with representatives from all the prospecting trails of the North, there was the sound expression that mining offers unusual possibilities for the young man.

Endorsed by J. E. Hammell, who proffered the first recognition, the Prospectors' Association proposes to annually award a medal to the prospector who in the opinion of the organization makes what is voted the major find of the season.

Typically a gathering of hale and hearty mining men, the dinner produced many highlights and individualism was rampant. W. H. Fairburn, as president, and Walter Segsworth and R. J. Jowsey, as association officials, together with Judge T. Godson, J. Errington, Russ Cryderman, dean of prospectors in Ontario; Frank Loring, Doug. Wright, S. Sainsbury and others expounded the value of the prospector.

That there is financing awaiting for the prospector who wants to go afield was the statement heard from responsible parties. Urge was made to the Dominion Government to advance the mining frontier, with distribution of maps outlining the sediments and other mineral conditions.

North Bay Protests Govt. Roads Policy

Board of Trade at North Bay Sends Formal Protest to Government. Also Asks Co-operation of Associated Boards of Trade and Local Boards.

Very decided objection was taken last week by the North Bay board of trade to the reported decision of the Ontario Government to discontinue maintenance work on Northern Ontario roads. The meeting at North Bay drafted a resolution drawing to the attention of the Government the absolute necessity of proper maintenance of the Ferguson highway and other trunk roads in the North. The resolution also asks that the North Bay board of trade seek the co-operation of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade, and all the local boards interested in the matter. The North Bay resolution makes reference to the great investment made in Northern roads to date and points out the fact that this money expended to build the roads is in jeopardy of loss through the absurd idea of dropping maintenance. The necessity for conserving the tourist trade is mentioned and it is very plain that if the roads are allowed to degenerate into "rock and ruin," the tourist trade will fade away.

In making prompt protest against the unreasonable idea of allowing the large investment in Northern roads to be jeopardized and the whole future of the North to be senselessly handicapped, the North Bay board of trade has shown a proper leadership. It should not be necessary for the North Bay board of trade to seek the co-operation of the local boards of the North or the help of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade in this matter. All these bodies as a matter of their own interest and the very safety of the North should make such strong protest to the Government that the panic that seems to have hit the administration at Queen's Park may be overcome and sound sense and real economy may be used to avoid shameful loss to the North Land that can not help but react on the rest of the province.

With the purchase of souvenir globes for the members of the Legislature, the securing of expensive antique furniture for some of the Government offices, the paying of large sums for paintings of provincial celebrities, there is on the one hand an apparent idea that Ontario has the odd dollar left yet. On the other hand nothing could justify the neglect of Northern roads as seems to be proposed, except actual bankruptcy. It is more than of interest to enquire "What is to be done with the three million dollars voted for Northern Development, if the money is not to be spent for roads maintenance?" Such a question naturally gives rise to other questions, not only in regard to the present, but also in reference to the past. It may be that the Government is making its suggestion about no road-work, as one partisan remarks, to get the people into a frame of mind that will not tempt them to be asking for needed works here. If the Government actually has no higher conception than that of the intelligence of the people it is certainly adding insult to injury. The Government by its utterly absurd attitude in regard to road maintenance in the North has alienated all its friends. If the Government has any regard at all for itself or its friends, it will at once "snap out of" the absurd panic it seems to have entered and get back to sound sense and economy.

Resolutions like that passed by North Bay board of trade may hasten the return of the right sort of economy and good judgment. Even the strongest Liberals in the North will feel that the sacrifice of the roads of the North is a high price to pay for a change in administration at Toronto.
