### Timmins Winner of A. F. Kenning Cup

Inter-town Bowling Trophy Goes to Timmins for the Second Time in Three Years. Timmins Took All Four Points in Final Game.

On Friday, April 28th, Timmins won all four points from the Schumacher bowlers on their own alleys to win the A. F. Kenning cup for the second time in three years.

The Schumacher boys had a hard grind all season, and were tied up five times.

The first game was won for Timmins by C. Studor who rolled a grand total of three hundred and forty-one pins to beat Schumacher.

The second game was also a tough battle and was in doubt, until the eighth frame when W. Tonkin the captain of the Timmins team who has bowled poorly all season happened to find a groove in the alleys and made a successive string of strikes, to roll three hundred and twenty-five, which made up for his previous delinquencies in former games.

The third game after the fifth string Timmins had a good lead and consistently held this advantage to the tenth frame.

Morandin of the Schumacher team was the only man to bowl a high average for three games rolling a total of seven hundred and forty-one.

McMillan, captain of the Schumacher team in the second game started off like a house on fire, with a number of strikes in a row, but after the sixth frame weakened badly but ended up with a nice score of two hundred and fifty-one.
