Production of Gold Up in First Quarter

Output of Province of Ontario, Including Exchange, has Increased by Half Million Dollars over Last Year.

Final compilation of production figures reported to the Ontario Department of Mines by Ontario gold mining companies show output in the first quarter of this year, slightly above the total for the corresponding quarter of last year. With exchange included, however, the value in Canadian funds was more than half a million dollars in excess of the figures for 1932. The totals were \$13,144,739 compared with \$12,605,817.

The list of producers in the Kirkland Lake belt has been increased by the Ashley and the T'burn and in North-western Ontario by the Moss mine, which started in April of last year. In the first quarter of this year, 18 mines were producing as against 15 in the first quarter of 1932.

Lake Shore held first place for first quarter production, output totalling \$2,657,109 without the premium and Hollinger was second with \$2,462,129. During the quarter receipts of crude gold bullion at the Royal Canadian Mint, Ottawa, from Ontario gold mines contained 571,598 fine ounces of gold and 83,630 fine ounces of silver, making a total value of \$11,837,386.

Panhandlers No Better in Timmins Than Toronto

When it comes to panhandlers, what applies to the city of Toronto has equal force in regard to Timmins. In a recent issue The Mail and Empire points out that "panhandling" is not justified in Toronto and that it should be discouraged by good-hearted citizens who will see the ill effects from allowing or encouraging this form of begging. The Mail and Empire points out that the city of Toronto makes provision for those in need and so panhandling is not necessary. The same is true about Timmins. Here is the editorial from The Mail and Empire:

"Men begging in increasing numbers on the downtown streets of Toronto may be a sign of Spring, but it is an unwelcome sign. The request generally is 'a dime for a cup of coffee,' but we are afraid that it is the dime rather than the coffee that is looked for. There is surely little necessity for these appeals. The city is spending a very large sum of money on relief. Welfare bureaus have been established in different parts of the city, and the Mayor has given the assurance that no man need go hungry in Toronto. These 'panhandlers' as they are called, know well the arrangements which have been made to assist them. Their appeals are often made under circumstances which render a refusal very embarrassing. But generous-minded citizens need have no hesitation in turning a deaf ear. To comply with these requests on the streets will increase the number of 'panhandlers' and add to the difficulties of a problem with which the civic authorities are trying earnestly to cope.

"Toronto is not the only city where this nuisance has appeared. Mayor Peebles, of Hamilton, has issued instructions to the police department to arrest as vagrants all 'panhandlers.' A vigorous campaign will be inaugurated in an effort to stop the nuisance which has proved annoying to citizens. The Fort Arthur News-Chronicle says that it is a question whether the 'panhandler' has become more expert at picking his prospect than Mr. Citizen has become in recognizing the 'panhandler.' Some Truths About Russia and Soviet

Record of Intrigue Against British Empire and Other Nations. Debts Repudiated by Russia. System of Trouble-Making.

With the recent farce trial of British engineers in Russia for an alleged crime which would have been senseless for the accused men to commit, and which disposed itself so far as Soviet court procedure would permit, there will be general interest in a summary of the Soviet's record in regard to the British Empire. Such a record is given in a recent issue of The London (England) Daily Express. The Express says:

Some Facts About Soviet Russia.

The Soviet's record of intrigue against the British Empire, her failure to pay her just debt, and her almost undisguised attempts to foment revolt in this country have made it imperative that Britons should be acquainted with at least a few items in Moscow's long Black list.

Of the original money loaned to Russia for war purposes, there is still £1,066,480,000 outstanding, and interest accumulating at the rate of £53,000,000 a year.

Britain will never regain that money. Even the most optimistic regard it as lost.

You Pay

The money was borrowed by Britain from America to lend to Russia, and British taxpayers are actually paying millions every year to America in interest for that loan. To that extent every man and woman in this country who pays income tax is bearing the burden of Russia's default.

And do you know that:

For 12 years more than 300,000 British people have been pressing 50,000 claims against the Soviet Government in respect of property confiscated to the extent of £285,000,000, as follows:

Confiscated properties, loans, timber, and oil-fields	£180,000,000
Sterling bonds	£40,000,000
Rouble bonds	£25,000,000
Miscellaneous claims	£40,000,000
Total	£285,000,000

Three years ago a series of committees were set up to deal with these questions. Representatives of the Soviet sat in equal numbers with British representatives on those committees. The awards were made but the Russians never paid.

Two Bad Cases.

There are two particularly bad cases. The Russia Asiatic Consolidated Ltd had £56,000,000 worth of property confiscated. Not a penny has been paid in compensation.

On the contrary, among that property were oil wells which the Russians actually have worked, and sold back to Britain the oil that is really British property.

Then there is the case of the Lens Goldfields. Claims amounting to more than £12,000,000 were awarded by the Anglo-Russian tribunal nearly three years ago. The Soviet agreed to the award, but not a penny has been paid.

Hundreds of questions have been asked in Parliament regarding this matter but no action has been taken.

Largest Army.

And do you know that:

Russia's liabilities in principal and interest to the countries of the world is more than £2,000,000,000. And the debt is growing every year.

There is no prospect of Russia ever paying anyone, but in the meantime she is using the credits which she is getting through British guarantees to build up the greatest fighting arm in the world.

Russia to-day has the largest army in Europe. She has by far the largest air service in Europe, and it is growing every month. Russian peasants are being slave-driven to provide the money to equip in most lavish manner her army and her air force.

And do you know that:

Sweated Russian goods are being dumped into this country to the detriment of our own workers. We pay Russia in hard cash £19,000,000 a year for timber and other goods, while in turn Russia takes £6,000,000 worth of goods. The balance of the credit provided by Britain is spent in other countries.

Every penny of the £19,000,000 spent by us in Russia could be spent in the British Empire.

Blasphemy.

And do you know that:

There is an even more sinister side to the picture? While Russia cannot find money to pay her debts, she can find many thousands of pounds every year to finance propaganda in Great Britain and Ireland, in India, Australia and South Africa.

In London alone she pays £8,000 a year in rents for premises from which her campaign is conducted.

Millions of mischievous and blasphemous pamphlets are circulated in this country every year. Twenty papers are published daily, weekly, and monthly to disseminate disloyal doctrines.

Even the Children

A special department has been set up in Stockholm from which anti-British propaganda is scattered worldwide.

Even the school children are not free from this blight of Communism. Special Soviet Sunday schools are conducted in the industrial areas where the children are being taught to scoff at religion and to revile the Creator.

A bill, which aims at preventing similar propaganda in schools in this country, introduced in the House of Commons by Sir Reginald Craddock (Cons., Combined English Universities) was published yesterday.

ANOTHER ACCIDENT FROM DOMESTIC USE OF GASOLINE

Another accident resulted recently at Kapuskasing from the use of gasoline for cleaning purposes. Mrs. R. Gagne, of Kapuskasing had immersed a dress in a pail of gasoline in the hopes of loosening some stains on the garment. Lifting it out of the pail to put the garment in the boiler on the stove apparently some of the gasoline or the gas from it became ignited and set fire to Mrs. Gagne's clothing. Her screams brought speedy help and the flames were beaten out, but not before Mrs. Gagne had suffered burns serious enough to require her removal to the hospital. There was also some damage to the kitchen from the fire, but the firemen soon stopped any danger of a serious fire. Fortunately, Mrs. Gagne is not seriously injured but she did suffer painful burns. The incident is another warning for the most exact care in handling gasoline for cleaning purposes, and even with that exact care there seems to be danger of damage of one kind or another.

Hollinger in Lead for Month of March

Ontario Gold Mines Exceed Four Million Dollars Production for the Month of March. Porcupine Well in Lead of Kirkland for Month.

Production figures for the gold mines as reported to the Ontario Department of Mines for March showed a substantial increase in value as compared with January and February. The Porcupine belt and Northwestern Ontario showed an improvement in production value on the 1932 monthly average, while Kirkland Lake was slightly lower. The month of March for the whole province was well above the average monthly production value for 1932.

The mines in order of output for March were as follows: Porcupine—Hollinger, McIntyre, Dome, Coniaraum, Vipond, and Buffalo-Ankerite, Hayden (clean up). Kirkland Lake—Lake Shore, Teck-Hughes, Wright-Hargreaves, Sylvanite, T'burn, Kirkland Lake Gold, Ashley and Barry-Hollinger. Northwestern Ontario—Howey, Parkhill, Moss and Minto.

Individual mines in order of output for March were: Hollinger, Lake Shore, McIntyre, Teck-Hughes, Dome, Wright-Hargreaves, Howey, Sylvanite, Coniaraum, T'burn, Vipond, Kirkland Lake Gold, Buffalo-Ankerite, Ashley, Barry-Hollinger, Parkhill, Moss, Minto.

Last Year's Plan of Sending Seeds and Roots to Drought-Stricken Areas of Saskatchewan to be Followed Again This Year.

Although the drought-stricken areas of Saskatchewan last year were turned into a country of bloom for the time being through the gift of seeds and roots from the horticulturists and amateur gardeners of Ontario and the Eastern provinces, yet much requires to be done to ensure a basis of permanent beautification. Last year's appeal for flower seeds, it will be remembered, was made from the Canadian Horticultural Council through the "More Beautiful Canada" committee, and by all the portents there is more than justification for another such request.

Hollyhocks will bloom in these areas this spring and perennial borders are springing up where nothing burgeoned before, but there is still much space to be covered and many homes to be embowered with flowers. Letters are ar-




