Police Officers of District Banquetted

Chief H. Jones Gives Second Annual Event in Honour of the Police Officers of the Town and District.

At the Empire hotel grill room on Tuesday evening, May 9th, the second annual banquet to the police officers of the town, township and district was tendered by H. Jones, chief of police of Timmins. In welcoming the guests Chief Jones said the gathering was to express appreciation for the splendid co-operation between all the forces and to continue the good fellowship always evident between the various police groups of the district. There were some thirty guests present, including members of the Timmins force, Tisdale force, Provincial police, Hollinger Mine police and Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Mayor Geo. S. Drew presided, and after a very attractive menu had been given justice, the mayor spoke of the satisfactory work of Chief Jones and his men and thanked the township of Tisdale police, the Hollinger police, the provincial and R.C.M.P. for the splendid co-operation given. There were brief but effective addresses by Crown Attorney S. A. Caldwell, Police Magistrate S. Atkinson, C. V. Gallagher, formerly reeve of Tisdale, Sgt. Gardiner of provincial force, Chief McInnis of Tisdale, Chief Hatch, of the Hollinger police, Constable Allen of the Mounties, Councilors J. K. Massie, John Morrison, R. Richardson and Moise Maltais, Constable A. Fulton, Schumacher, Constable Gauthier, G. A. Macdonald, P. C. Evans, clerk of the township of Tisdale and others. All spoke of the high character of the police officers and the fine co-operation between all forces.

There was special emphasis given to the efficiency and fairness of Magistrate Atkinson. In the magistrate's own brief but comprehensive address reference was made to the fact that the basis of all justice is truth and he urged the police to keep that fact ever in mind as only through truth was justice possible. Through respect for the truth the respect of the public was won. Magistrate Atkinson, in his eighteenth year of service to the Porcupine area as magistrate, said that there was no trouble in the police forces here such as was being encountered at present in some cases down south. Mr. Gallagher had praise for Magistrate Atkinson, the police and other law officers of the district. The brief addresses by Councilors Massie and Richardson were particularly effective. Councilor Massie, as chairman of the town police committee, expressed appreciation for the work of the police, and felt that the police of the North were a credit to the county. Before the close of the happy evening Chief Jones thanked all for their attendance and for the kind words given and hoped that the notable cooperation between the various police forces would continue at all times for the public advantage.

During the evening Chief Jones, Constable Fulton, Councilor Richardson and others favoured with solos that were much appreciated. Constables Gauthier, Laviolette and Ralph and Councilor Maltais got a great hand for the singing of "Allouette." There was much community singing during the evening with Councilor Richardson, Sgt. Gardiner, Constable Fulton and others leading the singing. It was a very happy evening and much enjoyed by all. Mr. Gallagher's suggestion for holding the event more frequently meeting with enthusiastic approval. The pleasant evening closed with the singing of "O Canada."

Northern Quebec Looking Hopefully to the Future

The forest industry of Abitibi is living in the hope that as a result of the recent conversations between Premier R. B. Bennett and President F. D. Roosevelt at Washington, the present duty of \$4 a thousand feet on wood exported from here to the United States will be abolished, and Quebec will again become an important factor in the U.S. wood market.

In this way, the situation in that part of the province was summed up last week at Quebec City by Hector Authier, member of the Legislative Assembly for Abitibi.

While the mining and agricultural industries are making good progress, the forestry industry in his country is in considerable difficulties, Mr. Authier stated. Owners of the mills have been forced to go into liquidation, not because they lack funds, but because they cannot find a market for their output. At the present time, he estimated, there is 135,000,000 ft. of wood lying in lumber yards, and most of it has been there for some time, as only 9,000,000 feet was cut last year.

The agricultural industry, however, is progressing very well, the member for Abitibi said. As an instance of the situation, he quoted the fact that 11 butter factories—one more than in last year—are now working full time. Last year, there were 500,000 pounds of butter produced in the country and indications are that the present season will be equally good. The mining industry is in similar good shape, two new 100 feet shafts having been sunk in the Harriicana district.

Interesting and Informative Address at Kiwanis Club

Kiwanian Jack Fulton, of the Taylor Hardware was the speaker at the Kiwanis Club on Monday. He spoke of electrical refrigeration. He had a working model machine on display at the meeting, open and showing all parts in action. Mr. Fulton gave a very graphic and clear description of the principles and workings of the mechanical refrigeration plan. He also gave a brief but effective talk on the economy of proper refrigeration of food. The address was greatly appreciated by all.

Dr. Day reported on the cases of the two youngsters operated upon at the hospital here through the support of the Kiwanis. Both youngsters were doing well, one being out of the hospital and well on the way to complete recovery.
