

Help Beautify the Homes and the Town

Secretary of Timmins Horticultural Society Asks All to Join the Society and Help on the Work of Beautifying the Town. Some Helpful Hints.

A. E. Taylor, secretary-treasurer, of the Timmins Horticultural Society, Box 947, Timmins, this week again writes The Advance urging all to join the Horticultural Society and help to beautify the homes and the town of Timmins. The bulbs to be given free to each new member joining the society this year will be ready about May 22nd, says Mr. Taylor. By joining the society now, the secretary says, you will be able to obtain perennials, roses, pansy plants and Black-cap raspberries at extremely low cost. In his letter Mr. Taylor gives some helpful hints to those interested in horticulture. He writes in part as follows:—

Planting Directions and Hints
Plant as soon as the ground becomes warm and the soil works up nicely. Avoid the common error of planting too deeply. Another most important point is thorough cultivation both before and after seeds are sown. Remember, good cultivation will practically eliminate the necessity for watering, unless a very dry spell occurs. Allow ample space for plant to attain full maturity by careful sowing and even discarding some plants if necessary.

Annals
These bloom the first year from seed and then die. They may be planted directly outdoors according to directions on packets, or if started early indoors, use sand and loam, mixed and sifted in shallow boxes or pots. Sow thinly in rows and cover lightly. Cover with glass. If kept in a sunlit window, place a sheet of paper over glass. Keep soil just nicely moist, and not wet. Watch, and as soon as plants appear, remove glass, and place in sunlight. Transplant as necessary to avoid crowding. Plants must be hardened by gradual exposure to sun and

air outdoors, before setting out in a permanent location. When moving plants keep as much earth as possible around the roots and do this work on an evening or cloudy day. Shade plants till established.

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
