CLIFTON MINES AGAIN IN ACTIVE NEWS OF THE DAY

A despatch this morning over the private wire of the F O'Hearn Co says:—Toronto, Ont., May 25.—Clifton Co. Mines is opening up good ore on its property in the Swayze gold area, according to mining interests who have just returned from the field. The vein on the property is said to be well mineralized and has been opened up for a distance of more than 800 feet. Samples recently obtained show free gold, but no assays are available at this time. It is the intention of the management to give further attention to surface work and later to do some diamond drilling.

NEGOTIATIONS TO PURCHASE HAYTIEN GOLD MINES, LIMITED

(From The Northern Miner)

The shareholders and creditors of the Hayden Gold Mines Limited held their first meeting in the office of N. L. Martin last week, when about 50 were present. Resolutions were passed appointing N. L. Martin, trustee and the following inspectors: W. J. H. Morris, barrister, Toronto, to represent the largest shareholders; C. C. Galvin, Toronto, barrister, representing other shareholders and creditors, and A. R. Harkness, of Timmins representing the northern creditors.

The statement submitted showed assets (without including the value of the claims and real estate) of \$670,000 with liabilities of a little over \$100,000. The property is situated three miles from Timmins and has been worked for a number of years. There is a shaft down 700 feet and a mill has been erected, with a capacity of 50 tons. There have been ore discoveries of varied values and a brick valued at \$1,500 was sent to the Royal Mint since the date of bankruptcy.

A number of people, including a large syndicate of shareholders, has expressed an interest in the enterprise with the object of purchase and negotiations are now under way for its disposal.

### Roads in North Will be Maintained This Season

On Thursday last Hon. Wm. Finlayson spent a few hours in town and a few citizens were able to meet him. On account of the fact that no definite information was available as to when he would be here, though he had replied to wires from here to the effect that he would visit Timmins some time during the week, it was impossible for any number interested to have opportunity to meet the Minister of Lands and Forests and Northern Development. The chief matter that most people wished to discuss was the report that Hon. Mr. Finlayson had stated that money would not be available even for the maintenance of the roads in the North. On his visit here Hon. Mr. Finlayson made it plain that there would be some money available for maintenance but no new work or construction of roads would be undertaken. At the same time it has been announced that the road from Kirkland Lake to Rouyn is to be completed this season. This is a construction work for which there is apparently money available. It should be completed all right, but so should other projects. The attitude of Hon. Mr. Finlayson that the roads of the North are not to be allowed to go to rack and ruin will be accepted with pleasure, but there is still question as to where the three million dollars voted for Northern Development can have gone, if money is as scarce as Hon. Mr. Finlayson suggests. During his visit here Hon. Mr. Finlayson is reported as regretting criticism of his department and the Government generally. It may be said in all kindness that he has himself to blame for this. His effort to make it appear that the North is unreasonable in seeking enough money for roads to assure the saving of the large investment made and to give the people a fair deal in road service explains the flood of criticism that was started in the North. Even yet the announcement of enough to maintain the Ferguson highway is not sufficient. There should also be assurance that settlers' roads will also be maintained. The North has been the one bright spot in the provincial horizon and to say the least it seems like poor business to discriminate unduly at this time against this section.

### Kirkland Transients Being Set to Place

These Refusing to Work have been Cut off Relief. Threat to Take Food from Stores will be Met by Stern Measures.

The majority of the people of Kirkland Lake seem to make light of the reports as to difficulties encountered in regard to the alien agitators posing as unemployed. The outside newspapers, however, have made much of the situation and there certainly is something to it. Last week a "strike" was declared by the alien agitators who objected to the idea of being asked to give a day's work a week for a full week's relief maintenance. In place of giving any work the alien agitators seemed to think the council should accept a list of silly demands. The reeve and council were firm in the matter and it was officially announced by Reeve O'Meara that any who would not do the work should be cut off relief. Then the alien agitators tried another game. They picketed the municipal work in progress and attempted to coax or coerce men from working. Disregarding this mischief a number of men continued at work and others joined them. The alien agitators then got up a mob and men proceeding on trucks to the municipal work were stopped and attempt made to drag them from the trucks. Police hastily summoned stopped this riot of the aliens and all noticed in the truck were at once cut off from further relief. Reeve O'Meara announced that the town had decided the transients well and if they would not be fair and decent they would find the results most unpleasant. Arrangements were made to handle any situation that might occur, the Legion and other organizations co-operating with the police to assure law and order. The soup kitchen at Kirkland Lake was closed down and arrangements completed to feed only those willing to work. The hint was given that the others would be driven out of the town if they refused to be half-way decent. In the meantime it was made plain that there was only a limited time in which the transients could accept the plan to do a little work for the relief given them. A number took advantage of the opportunity, but some others were foolish enough to listen to the agitators paid well to create and foster trouble. On Monday of this week a number of the unemployed turned up ready to do their allotted work, only to find, however, that the patience of the people of Kirkland Lake had been at last exhausted and that the offer of food work was no longer in force so far as the "strikers" were concerned. They were given a full week to come to their senses but they neglected to act decently, one official is quoted as saying. He added that they waited till they saw that the town was in real earnest and that they could not put over their mean tactics any longer. They then cowardly ingrates thought they could sneak in on the work programme. They were too late. This action by Kirkland Lake cuts a large number of single unemployed men off relief and it is very doubtful whether any of them will get another chance at Kirkland Lake in view of their persistent refusal to play fairly. A large number of these lazy transients have already moved away from Kirkland Lake. It is to be hoped that few of them have come to Timmins. This town has no room for any more unemployed and least of all the type of fellows like the Kirkland curses—the breed that refuse to work and want to listen to themselves talking. The authorities are said to be fully prepared at Kirkland Lake for

any eventualities. In Kirkland Lake there is a strong undercurrent of opinion that the alien agitators and their silly dupes have long overstayed their welcome in the Lake Shore town and that the slightest excuse should be accepted to drive them out of the locality in the same way that Cochrane got rid of the pests a couple of years ago. It is very apparent that the better "demands" are used the more their "demands," and the greater nuisance they become. Cochrane has had no trouble at all since they used the baseball bats on these alien agitators. The people of Kirkland Lake are pretty well "fed up" with the continual mischief made by the alien agitators and if the latter are forcibly and roughly ejected from Kirkland Lake they will have no one but themselves to blame.

Reports from Kirkland Lake this week are to the effect that some of the alien agitators, posing as unemployed, say that if they do not receive relief on their own terms, they will break in to the stores and take what they want. The same sort of talk was indulged in by the same type of fellows here, but in both cases the authorities were confident that with the co-operation of the decent people, law and order can be enforced and the alien blackmailers effectively dealt with.
