Illustrated Account of South America and Its People to be Continued at Next Meeting of Kiwanis Club.

The visitors for the day were Jerry Gordon and Mr. Ash. The acting president, Vince Woodbury, read a letter from President Reg. Smith, who is in England. President Reg. reports a very fine trip. The speaker for the day was J. B. Simpson, of Schumacher, and his illustrated talk on South America and its people made such a hit with the club through its interest and information that Mr. Simpson was prevailed upon to continue it at the meeting on Monday next.
