**Making Good**  
For a very considerable time several ex-servicemen had established themselves in a camp, just on the outskirts of the town. There had been much comment as to why the Legion was encouraging these men to stay around. One of the officers of the Legion relief fund, being a good reader of a man's character, often used the remark:—"Give any one of them a chance and he'll make good." Sometimes existing on frugal meals during the winter months the men hung on with the hopes of getting a break. When spring arrived they secured odd jobs, taking off screen windows, etc. and their calls to the Legion relief fund became less and less. Good weather broke and came the sunlight to these men. One secured a job to build a house; he got his pals of the long winter hours to help him. The house has been finished and the result of the labour has been such that they now have three more to erect. They are making good. This episode does not finish at that point. Having occasion to secure a little food they asked for assistance which was

gladly given. Upon the receipt of the money earned the value of this voucher was returned to the Legion relief fund with a little interest added also. One may say:—"They are exceptions," but the fact is they are loyal and honest returned soldiers like hundreds more, waiting for the break. Any of them who have had a term of unemployment will make good if given a chance. These men of the camp, have been cursed and called uncomplimentary names, but they held on with the spirit which won the war and will eventually beat the depression. They are making good. Won't you help some of the others in preference to the foreigner. Any odd job will do to start with.

**First King's Counsel to be Appointed in Timmins**  
Last week the list of new King's Counsel appointments were announced by the Ontario Government. There are 155 in the list, 83 being from the ranks of ex-servicemen among the barristers and solicitors of Ontario. Eight of the new K.C.'s are members of the Legislature, and 64 are in the general list.

For the first time in the history of the town Timmins has a member of the legal fraternity practising here appointed as a K.C. This is Gordon Howard Gauthier, whose name is among those on the list of the present appointments to the honour. Mr. Gauthier is the dean of the legal fraternity in this section of the North. Other appointments to the honour of K.C. among those practising in the North include that of Albert Victor Waters, of Cochrane, the popular member for the north riding in the Legislature. John Alexander McPhail, Sault Ste. Marie; Thos. Murray Mulligan, Geo. Joseph Valin, and Elvin Dean Williams, all of Sudbury, are the other new K.C.'s for the North.
