We visited them in the order given The latter was difficult for me to identify as it is changed so greatly. ready policeman was accosted for the information. He said, "You're standing beside it, man!" "But," said I "there is no sign to that effect." Policeman-"There doesn't need to be -every person knows that is the Bank of England." I suppose he is right but I felt like buying a piece of chalk and breaking one British tradition by naming the building. The guide who showed us around was dressed in 16th Century uniform. He told us that the building only covered three and three quarters acres and that the present staff of 5000 men were able to keep fairly well caught up with the work. Each day the amount of gold in the vaults is posted up for everyone to read. On May 18th it was £ 185,988,501whatever that means. In the Royal Exchange a large painting depicts the founding of the Bank of England July 27th, 1694, and as it has been able to keep its doors open for business ever since we thought it best not to suggest any alteration of procedure.
