**Work at Cemetery is Highly Commended**

Canadian Legion Hears Good Report of Work Being Carried Out to Respect Departed Comrades. Other Matters Discussed.

The final general meeting of the session for the Timmins branch of the Canadian Legion was held on Monday evening. There was a very good attendance.

The meeting opened in usual way with President T. Parsons in the chair. Three new members were accepted into the branch.

Honorary membership fees were accepted with a vote of thanks from the following:—Hon. Chas. McCrea, Minister of Mines for Ontario; Dr. H. H. Moore, W. H. Pritchard, G. A. Mac-

donald, of Timmins, and E. J. Mason, Dome Mines, the last named being present and addressing the branch.

The report of the Conkili Shows was very gratifying to the members. Not only did the shows help the Legion, but it was mentioned that several of the unemployed members who had taken tickets during the week would be paid for their services. All others including some who had been working at the cemetery for the Legion, generously gave their time for the cause and success of the event.

Comrade Neame mentioned the work being carried on at the Timmins Cemetery in connection with returned soldiers' graves. The work was under the direction of Comrade Dingley, who was giving much time. "It was a difficult task to find all the graves," said Comrade Neame, "because apparently no cemetery register had been kept. It would be a good suggestion for the town council to look into this and see that the burial grounds are properly marked out, and the graves registered. Up to date about twelve graves have been cleaned up and re-sodded and poppies planted, also a Flanders Cross placed on each one." In closing the speaker suggested asking the town for a veterans' plot and have this ground made ready for those who may pass away in the future. When the work is completed the entire Legion here will hold a Decoration day service which will be carried on as an annual affair hereafter.

Plans were completed for the annual zone picnic to Cochrane on Sunday, July 9th.

The members were also asked to turn out in full force for the annual drum-head service on Sunday next, June 25th. Parade will march at the Oddfellows' hall at 2:30 and march to athletic grounds. Service at 3 p.m. sharp, with Rev. Bruce Millar officiating, assisted by other clergy of the district. The Timmins Citizens' band will be in attendance and furnish the music for hymns.

A short social time was held, during which the branch had the pleasure of hearing some very finely executed violin solos by Mr. Hass, a visitor to the camp from the West. Comrade A. Bellamy also obliged and the meeting closed at the midnight hour with the singing of the National Anthem.

**Given Two Months for Assaulting Wife**

Two Boys Allowed to go on Suspended Sentence for Theft of Bicycle. Other Cases at Police Court This Week.

At police court here on Tuesday, E. Larose was charged with assaulting his wife. The wife complained to the police when he struck her and kicked her when she objected to the presence of another woman in the house. Magistrate Atkinson sent him down for two months, the wife bearing the marks of brutal usage, one eye being damaged as well as other injuries being sustained. The accused said that he did not remember kicking his wife but admitted that the dispute developed into physical violence.

Two boys were found guilty of the theft of a bicycle. The bicycle was returned to its rightful owner and the two lads were allowed to go on suspended sentence.

A charge of wilful damage was remanded to July 4th, as were also two cases under the Highway Traffic Act.

The charge of selling liquor against Arthur Lablond, 5 Kirby avenue, upstairs, was remanded to July 4th, as was also the case of a Mountjoy man on a charge of assaulting his wife, and the case of a woman at the same address who was on the docket for obstructing the police in the performance of their duty.

A Highway Traffic Act case was dismissed when the evidence was heard.

A case under the Master and Servant Act was remanded to July 4th.

There were two ordinary, everyday, common drunks. Each of them was assessed \$10.00 and costs, or thirty days. One of them paid and the other for lack of the fine and costs has gone to Haileybury to remain at that summer resort for the next thirty days.

A Kirby avenue man pleaded guilty to a charge of reckless driving and was fined \$10.00 and costs, the fine and costs being paid forthwith.
