While his mother, brother and sister from Kirkland Lake were watching the stunt, Lorne Chaput, the twenty-five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Chaput, of Kirkland Lake, and brother of Miss Florence Chaput, teacher at the Separate Schools, Timmins, was fatally injured while performing an automobile stunt at New Liskeard Beach on Friday evening of last week. Friends in Timms will extend to Miss Chaput the deepest and most sincere sympathy in the loss of her brother in this tragic way.

According to word from New Liskeard it would appear that Lorne Chaput had undertaken to give a leaping automobile exhibition, and for the purpose, a wooden incline rising to eight feet above the ground had been erected in front of the beach grandstand. His intention was to speed up this pathway in the open car, shoot into space and land on all four wheels, and he had performed the feat without mishap in other places, it is stated.

This time, apparently because his machine did not have sufficient speed, the front wheels dropped as the car reached the top of the incline, and the automobile nose-dived to the ground, bounced and then somersaulted, the rear of the car striking the driver, who had been partly thrown out by the accident.

Dr. Fleming, who had witnessed the accident, told Coroner J. H. McCullough's jury that Chaput had been struck a crushing blow when the car overturned, and he said the young man did not recover consciousness after being taken to hospital. According to Constable John Prestorius, provincial officer, who also was an eye-witness, Chaput warned up his car on the road and then circled the half-mile race track once. As he neared the incline, the car was swinging considerably and its speed, the constable estimated at not more than 45 miles an hour. The crash happened a few moments later.

After the accident at the beach, Lorne Chaput was hurried to the New Liskeard hospital where all possible was done to save his life. All medical skill and nursing care proved unavailing and Lorne Chaput died at the hospital a couple of hours after the accident. According to the evidence given at the opening session of the coroner's inquest on Saturday morning, death was due

to a fracture of the base of the skull, as well as to hemorrhage and shock. Dr. Russell Fleming gave evidence to this effect at the inquest on Saturday morning.

Following the tragedy the victim's mother left for home by car, which was in another accident, although without serious results, while a daughter, Miss Florence Chaput, Timmins school teacher, on her way to Toronto to take a course of summer study, learned of the fatality only when she called at the family home en route. Prior to making the effort, Chaput is said to have been uneasy in mind, but had decided to complete the bargain he had made with the local fire department, under whose auspices the stunt was advertised. It was at the young man's own insistence that his mother was present, it is said.

Alberta Coal to Come Here at Much Reduced Rates
A freight rate of \$5.50 per ton on shipments of Alberta coal to Northern Ontario points has been announced for this summer. The Haileyburian says last week. This is a reduction from \$7 per ton, which was the lowest rate previously granted by the railways in conjunction with the Dominion Government.

The reduction this year, which will greatly encourage the use of the Canadian product in this section of Ontario has been arranged through the direct intervention of Hon. W. A. Gordon, K.C., Minister of Mines for Canada and Temiskaming's representative in the Cabinet. He has had the whole coal situation under review and, while only meagre reports of his findings have been made public, it is safe to say that there will be definite results if that is at all possible.

Of the two games Saturday's was the best, but that is saying nothing against Monday's game. It should be noted that McIntyre fully won its honours on merit.
