Many Seek Help From Town Council

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mission, providing they see that the most suitable size of pipe is used in the installation of the water services. The residents of the area called Spring Creek complained about the water from Spring Creek flooding their gardens and cellars and doing other damage. They asked the council to dredge out the creek and take other steps to avoid the flooding in the spring. The committee concerned will investigate and see if anything can be done.

Council had a number of requests for assistance in various forms. A widow begged for relief work for her son so that he could help to keep the family without the necessity for direct relief. Council pointed out that there were scores of cases just as worthy, but it would be seen what could be done to help her and her son.

Another lady who has been in Timmins about a year wanted transportation for herself and her son so that they might go back to Montreal where they had friends. It was suggested that the town might save money by advancing the fares and thus avoiding the cost of the mother and son going on direct relief. "We certainly can't afford to ship back all who come here," said the mayor. The mayor also pointed out that they had arranged their own transportation to come here and they and their friends should arrange the financing of the return trip. In the meantime the mayor advised the lady to take the question up with the Timmins Relief Fund committee and see if anything could be done.

A man who has been a citizen of Timmins for a number of years was present at the council meeting to see if he could get any help in reference to an operation necessary for the removal of a growth on his face. The doctor said such an operation was necessary if the man were not to lose his health and perhaps his life. He would be in a few days in the hospital and the total cost was expected to be around \$50.00. A friend who spoke to the council in the matter said that the man had had hard luck. He had owned property in town, but had been forced to sell this property on account of his health and now the money was all gone.

The man, however, had not been on relief to date, and if the council gave the assistance asked the money would be repaid when times became better. In the course of the discussion it developed that when this man was asked to turn in his liquor permit he had first evaded the issue and then claimed he had lost the permit. His friend explained that the permit had been lost when the man was picking berries. The permit was in the man's coat pocket and the coat had been laid down. Later the coat could not be located. It might have been stolen or simply the man could not locate the place he had laid the coat. In any case there was not much on the permit. The matter was referred to the relief committee to investigate and see what the operation would really cost.

A young man with a small family who has been on relief work for some time, has been ordered to the hospital by his doctor for an operation for appendicitis. He asked the council if they could help him so that he could have the necessary operation. The matter was turned over to Relief Officer I. E. Dunn to see what could be done and what was actually necessary.

A young woman whose husband is working at the Moss Mines asked for town help until her husband gets his first pay. She explained that she had a small baby and so could not go out herself to work. It was pointed out that this woman's husband was the man who had been sent to the Moss Mines some months ago at the expense of the town, and then had quit his job in a week or so to come back here to visit his wife who was supposed to be seriously ill, but was not in danger. Council did not think continued help was deserved in such cases where those concerned did not play fair.
