One of the Issues of the First Newspaper of the Porcupine

Was Typewritten Budget of News and Views. It was Called The Porcupine Quill. Later was Printed at Haileybury. Col. A. W. Gray, Grand Master of the Oddfellows, Ontario, has Interesting Little Newspaper of Early Days. Full Contents Given Herewith.

Col. A. W. Gray, Grand Master of the Oddfellows, Ontario, who paid his official visit to the Porcupine camp this week, was in the Porcupine before in the very early days. He followed his profession as surveyor in this country more than twenty years ago, and he has some interesting souvenirs of his life here.

Even the heading has particular interest now.—"The Quill. Vol. 1, No. 20, Porcupine, May, 21st, 1910. Published on the afternoon of each Wednesday and Saturday; office opposite Recorder's office, Porcupine. Charles E. Gradwell, B.A., managing editor and proprietor."

Tribute to Timmins Bros. "To the man in this camp it must be a source of gratification to hold up a weapon as strong as the Timmins Mine to silence all classes of knockers, pessimists, sepiets, and those with pre-judged minds, and in passing it is well to recognize that this camp owes a debt of gratitude to the Timmins Brothers who were among the first to recognize the possibilities of Porcupine and to take a chance with their capital."

Justice W. E. Raney Dies At Toronto This Week Justice, W. E. Raney, of the Supreme Court of Ontario, one-time Attorney-General in the Ontario Progressive Government of Hon. E. C. Drury, died at Toronto on Monday of this week after a brief illness.

While Gibson and Sterling, general merchants at Porcupine, were receiving a substantial cash payment for claims here their buildings and goods were being consumed by flames in Porcupine in the

Golden City Fire." Answers to Correspondents The Quill devoted a full page to "Answers to Correspondents," and there is much interesting information on this page. Here are the items not mentioned elsewhere in this article:—"A. H. B. Haileybury.—The company owning the townsite on the north-west side of the lake is known as the Porcupine Development Co., and Mr. George Legge is the agent. His address is Post Office, Porcupine."

Finance.—There are two banks in this camp, both situated on the north-west side of the lake, the Traders Bank of Commerce, of which Mr. G. G. Bullard is the manager, and the Bank of Ottawa, of which H. St. Clayton is the manager.

Religion.—There are two ministers at present resident in the camp, Mr. J. F. Morris, representing the Methodists, and Rev. A. P. Menzies, M.A.

Transport Facilities The matter of the transportation facilities for the Porcupine camp was mentioned in several items in The Quill. One of these items said:—"The means of transport between Porcupine and the steel have been much facilitated by the installation of a motor launch service by a Mr. W. N. Burns. Passengers will be able to leave Porcupine in the morning, walking to Hills, where the launch W.N.B. will start daily at noon making the trip to the steel in one day. The fare from Hills will be \$2.00 for some sixteen miles of water route."

Death at South End The Quill had the following reference to a death, the only one mentioned in the issue:—"A Frenchman by the name of Mineault, who came into camp several weeks ago and has been sick since his arrival, died on Sunday last of fever. He was buried at the Point butting into Porcupine Lake on Wednesday last. The service was conducted by Mr. J. F. Morris and Rev. A. P. Menzies."

BODY FOUND OF MISSING NORTH BAY INSURANCE MAN

In May of last year the disappearance of Edward G. Tilt, insurance agent of North Bay, was reported and despite the most careful search an enquiry no trace was found of the missing man until last week when the car in which he had been riding and the dead body of the man himself were found in the river some nine miles from Sturgeon Falls and four miles from Field. The last the family heard of the late Mr. Tilt was when he phoned home from Sturgeon Falls that he was driving on to Field but would be home in the evening. There was no possible reason known why he should either disappear or do away with himself. People who had talked with him the day of his disappearance reported that he seemed in normal frame of mind and the idea of him committing suicide seemed absurd. It was impossible to find any clue that suggested any foul play. Search for the car and the man alike proved unavailing. The reports of the inquest held at Sturgeon Falls last week do not give details as to how the car and man crashed into the river, but the verdict of the jury was that of accidental death by drowning, so it would seem that neither foul play nor self-destruction were responsible for the death, but just one of those unfortunate accidents that happen sometimes. The body was badly decomposed when found, but from a wallet, watch and other articles it was possible

to identify the dead man. When the river is at its height as it was when the accident occurred there would be at least ten feet more of water in the river. The recent dry spell lowered the water so much that the top of the car was exposed and investigation followed.
