Pioneer Honoured by Iroquois Falls

W. J. Tierney Guest of Honour at Several Events Previous to Leaving Iroquois Falls for the South.

Previous to leaving Iroquois Falls to take up residence in the South, W. J. Tierney, pioneer of Iroquois Falls, and for over twenty years occupying responsible positions with the Abitibi Company and giving notable public service to the town and district, was shown honour and appreciation by his fellow workers and citizens at Iroquois Falls.

A number of presentations were held the early part of the week. On Monday evening of last week Mr. Tierney was given a toaster at a supper held in the Columbus hall by the third degree Knights of Columbus; on Tuesday evening the fourth degree Knights presented him with a silver percolator at a similar affair; on Wednesday night, at a smoker held in the Columbus club by the superintendents of the Abitibi Power and Paper Company he was presented with a silver tray and sugar and cream set matching the gift of the fourth degree Knights, mill manager T. E. Silver making the presentation.

The big event, however, was on Friday evening last when a stag smoker, attended by over 125, was sponsored by the lodges, unions and various other organizations in Iroquois Falls to honour "Bill" Tierney, one of the pioneers of Iroquois Falls district. The event was held in the town hall. Mayor Geo. S. Cameron presided and opened the event with a neat speech in which he expressed the general appreciation for Mr. Tierney and the regret at his departure. F. E. Wood, on behalf of those in attendance presented Mr. Tierney with a handsome club bag. Mr. Tierney made fitting response evidencing the wit and humour for which he has been well known through the North for many years. There were also brief but effective addresses by T. E. Silver and Les Johnson; step dancing, vocal solos, recitations, instrumental numbers also featured the evening, as well as community singing.

W. J. Tierney, who is well and very favourably known all through the North is one of the oldest employees of the Abitibi Power & Paper Co. He went to Iroquois Falls in May, 1913, and has occupied positions of responsibility and importance in the company's employ from that date to the present. He made the trip from McDougal Chutes (Matheson) by canoe. He watched the town of Iroquois Falls grow from a place in the bush to its present beauty and importance, and as he watched he did his full part in helping the growth of the town and the development of the big industry of the town. During the time of the Porcupine fire of 1916 he was fire chief at Iroquois Falls and gave notable service at much risk as the fire threatened the Falls district. Mr. Tierney was one of the first town councillors at Iroquois Falls, an active worker in the Falls board of trade and held many other important public and community offices.

Mr. Tierney left on Tuesday of this week to take up residence at his former home at Merriton, Ontario.
