Local Ukrainians Protest Strongly

Object to Soviet Tyranny. Largely Attended Meeting Here on Sunday at the Canadian Ukrainian Prosvita Hall.

A largely attended meeting was held in the Canadian Ukrainian Prosvita hall, corner of Elm and Fifth avenue, to protest against the Russian Soviet and its emissaries in this country.

And Whereas the Ukrainians in Canada continuously receive letters from their relatives in the Soviet Ukraine reporting death from starvation, of their fathers, mothers, brothers and sisters, which reports are substantiated by immigrants coming from the Soviet Ukraine to this country;

And Whereas requisitions of all grain by the Soviet Government Officials in the Ukraine are going on even now regardless of the fact that the conditions of famine and starvation still exist;

Whereas the rich and fertile land of the Ukraine was forced into the Union of the Soviet Socialist Republic against the will of the majority of the Ukrainian people;

And Whereas the Soviet Government rules the Ukraine against the best interests of the Ukrainian people;

And Whereas it is in the best interests of the Ukrainian people to be independent of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics;

Be it Resolved that the Ukrainian Canadians will use all their powers to help their brothers to break away from the rule of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and assist them in the formation of the independent Ukrainian State.

Whereas the Ukrainian Labor News, the Farmer's Life, and The Working Woman, are periodicals published in the interests of the Communist movement and propaganda among the Ukrainians in Canada;

And Whereas the said papers only publish news favourable to Soviet regime in the Ukraine;

And Whereas the said papers never attempted to present the actual state of affairs in the Ukraine;

And Whereas the said papers, in the interests of the Soviet regime, deny the conditions of famine in the Ukraine;

Be it Resolved that the work of the said papers is detrimental to the interest of the population of the Ukraine, and that the Ukrainians in Canada shall use all their powers to contract the destructive activity of the said papers among the Ukrainians in Canada.

Whereas the Government of the Union of the Soviet Socialist Republics has continuously been treating the Soviet Ukraine as its colonial dependency;

And Whereas the population of the Ukraine has consistently and determinedly resisted this policy of the Soviet Government;

And Whereas the Soviet Government for the purpose of breaking down such resistance has instituted the system of forcible migration and deportation of great masses of the Ukrainian population from Ukrainian territory to the far ends of Soviet Republics;

And Whereas such policy threatens annihilation of the Ukrainian race;

Be it Resolved that we strongly protest against this policy of the Soviet Government as violating the most cardinal rights of the Ukrainian people to live on their own territory and appeal to the civilized world to create a strong public opinion to force the Soviet Government to desist from this policy of the annihilation of the Ukrainian race.

\$3,714,174 ONTARIO RELIEF PLANS PASSED AT OTTAWA

Public works costing \$3,714,174, of which \$1,763,492 are for Toronto, have been approved by the Federal Government as the first municipal relief programme for Ontario, it was announced at Ottawa on Friday last.

The programme, which represents the request of 15 municipalities as approved first by the provincial government and then submitted here, comprises works which will be undertaken during the coming winter to create jobs. The Dominion, the provinces and the municipalities all will contribute.

Second to Toronto in the size of its programme is Ottawa, with \$1,408,735 approved. Hamilton is authorized to begin works costing \$31,636, while York township is represented by one of the smaller totals on the list, \$9,500.

Following are the amounts approved for other centres, Sarnia, \$42,900; Burk's Falls, \$600; Maxville, \$2,000; Chatham, \$30,000; Fergus, \$8,600; Brantford, \$194,850; Ingersoll, \$6,500; Parry Sound, \$3,575; Stratford, \$198,380; Port Arthur, \$12,400; Bobcaygeon, \$1,006.

Father of Rev. Sister Mary Irene Dies at North Bay

The North Bay Nugget last week says:—"A district pioneer and a highly-respected resident of North Bay for sixteen years, in the person of Hugh Bogue, died at the family residence, 38 Timmins street, last (Thursday) evening. Mr. Bogue had been in ill health for some time but it was only recently that his condition became alarming. The funeral will be held from the residence on Saturday morning at 8:45 o'clock to St. Mary's Cathedral for requiem high mass at 9 o'clock. Interment will be made in the family plot, St. Mary's cemetery. Mr. Bogue was born in County Tyrone, Ireland, and was in his 64th year. He came to Canada in his seventeenth year and for a time followed the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway from North Bay to Port Arthur. Returning east he took up land in Chisholm township, near Powassan, to be one of the first to break the soil in that prosperous agricultural community. He quit the farm in 1917 to come to North Bay to take employment with the Canadian Pacific Railway and was since identified with the Car Department. He was employed and lived at Copper Cliff for a short time in 1900. Mr. Bogue was an active member of the Knights of Columbus and of the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen. He was married at Copper Cliff in 1900 to Margaret Mahon and soon after returned to resume farming in Chisholm township. He is survived by his widow, one son, Patrick W., North Bay, and one daughter, Rev. Sister Mary Irene of the Grey Nuns, stationed at Timmins. The surviving members of the immediate family are, Patrick Bogue, Chisholm township, and Bernard Bogue, Hamilton, brothers, and Mrs. P. R. Owens, Mrs. D. Hanrahan, Mrs. J. Humphrey and Mrs. Charles O'Connor, all of Powassan, and Mrs. E. Morton, North Bay, sisters."
