

Jack Ede Drowned Near Iroquois Falls

Well-Known as a Hockey Fan and a Good Citizen, J. C. Ede, of Iroquois Falls, Lost his Life in Read Lake

Hundreds of people in Timmins and district and throughout the North generally will regret the death of J. C. Ede, of Iroquois Falls. The late Mr. Ede was very well-known partly on account of his prominence as a hockey fan. He went with the Falls team to every match and was popular everywhere. In Iroquois Falls he was highly esteemed, being prominent in sports, a member of the Iroquois Falls Hunt Club, the Oddfellows, and an official of the union. Mr. Ede was 56 years of age at the time of death. For eighteen years past he had been on the staff of the Abitibi Power and Paper Co., at Iroquois Falls, being oiler in the steam plant. He was an adherent of St. Mark's Anglican church, Iroquois Falls. The late Mr. Ede met death in the waters of Read Lake on Saturday last, while out duck-hunting. He was accompanied on the hunting trip by Joe Chirooski and Pete Gregoroschuk. Chirooski, who is a well-known hockey player, having played with the Iroquois Falls Eskimos for years, tells the story of the tragedy in a despatch sent out on Monday from the Falls. His story is given as follows:

"Jack and myself were in a small canoe hunting ducks, with Pete on shore. The lake was very rough and

just about five o'clock, when we were going to call it a day, we saw a flock out farther in the lake and Jack thought we should take a shot at them. We did, and turned back for shore; Jack was in the bow.

"We saw some more ducks and thought we would take another shot at them. I shot and we must have got into the wash of the waves, for the light canoe turned over.

"Jack couldn't swim, so he hung on to the canoe and I started swimming for shore. The boat got away from Jack again and I went to help him, but found my leg tangled with the rope from the canoe. I might have been able to help Jack if my leg had not got tangled with the rope. I made shore and some settlers nearby helped me and Pete came along and got a car and took me home."

"The body was recovered on Sunday morning about 300 feet from shore. After inquiry into the circumstances of the tragedy, the coroner W. J. Grummett decided that a jury inquest was not necessary, the facts of the case being clear and the sad event being due to misadventure.

"The funeral took place on Tuesday of this week at Iroquois Falls and was very largely attended, the number present and the many floral tributes expressing the high esteem in which Mr. Ede was held and the deep regret at his sad death.

Be Sure Your Name is on Voters' Lists

Lists Now Posted up for Public Inspection. See to Your Name Being on the List Now. Don't Wait Till it is Too Late.

Every year at election time there is complaint because this or that name is left off the voters' list. "They left my name off the voters' list, but they didn't forget to have me on the tax roll," is one of the common complaints when a name fails to appear on the voters' lists. With over 6,200 names on the lists it is easy to see how one or more names might be omitted accidentally, without much blame to those preparing the list. In addition there are sometimes technical reasons why a name may be omitted from the list. It may be that from wrong information given one name may be placed instead of another. With 6,249 names there are lots of things that may happen. But there is little excuse for any name being left entirely off the list. It is the fault in reality of no one but the voter if this occurs. The law requires every voter to see that his or her name is duly on the list. The lists are posted up now in the usual places, the clerk's office, the post office, and so on. And every voter should see the list and be sure that his or her name is on. If in any doubt see the town clerk. This year there is a chance for a man to miss his name, though it may actually be on the list. It is best to be absolutely sure now. If the name is not on the list it may be added now. It is no use waiting till election day and then strenuously objecting because of the omission. This year there are thirty-three polling sub-divisions in place of the seventeen last year. That means that in most cases names are not listed in the same polling places as last year. Accordingly this is one year when it is doubly wise to be sure that your name is on the list if you are entitled to a vote.
