Largely Attended Meeting on Sunday Evening Hears Dr. Lorna Colton Talk on the Principles of the

There was a large attendance at the meeting held in the Goldfields theatr on Sunday evening in the interests the C.C.F. The special speaker for the evening was Dr. Lorna Colton, of Toronto, who proved more eloquent and clever than any of the previous speakers coming here to expound C.C.F doctrine. A. M. Stuart, C.C.F. candidate for the provincial house for this riding also spoke briefly. Dr. Colton spoke at much length, taking up each of the points in the C.C.F. platform. She proved a very able and pleasing speaker and held the attention of the audience in effective way. She denied that the C.C.F. was red or disloyal and had several slaps at the old line parties, the newspapers and others. She seemed inclined to suggest that everything and everybody was tied up with the financial interests, except the C.C.F. The latter she described as the party of the poor.
