

\$3,640,000.00 Spent in This Part of North, 1926 to 1933

Interesting Figures of Provincial Government Expenditures in South Cochrane District in the Past Seven Years. Amount Expended Last Year was \$261,198.30 for Roads and More for Relief. Figures Given for Each Year on Roads.

The following letter from A. F. Kenning, M.P.P., for South Cochrane riding, explains itself and certainly gives facts and figures that are most interesting and informative. In giving out this information in the easily understood form in which he presents it Mr. Kenning is following his usual practice of keeping the public fully informed on public questions of interest.

1927 and 1928 you will find that our expenditures ran, since October 31st, 1926, to about \$3,640,000.00. Since the 31st of October, 1928, which is the end of our fiscal year we were allotted a district engineer of our own, whose work covered the riding of South Cochrane exclusively, and it is covering the expenditures subsequent to that date that the attached statement refers.

There are in this district close to seven hundred miles of road of which almost two hundred miles are maintained daily. The personnel of our permanent district staff, at the head of which is Mr. Donald Lough, is second to none in the Department of Northern Development. We have three district inspectors who have a great amount of experience in road building in the North and who have ever since I have been member given me all the assistance that is in their power.

My one reason for furnishing this statement at the present time is to bring before the public the cost of building roads and the gigantic effort that is being made by the present government to develop a country, of which we, citizens of the province of Ontario, have an unbounded faith. To those of this riding who should at any time desire any information with regard to this as to where certain amounts of money have been spent, no matter how small, I will be only too pleased at any time to furnish this information from my office in this town.

February Dividend for the Buffalo-Ankerite

A dividend payment of five cents per share is planned to be paid to shareholders of the Buffalo-Ankerite on Feb 15th, 1934. The word from Buffalo-Ankerite is pleasing and most encouraging to shareholders. Gold recovered from May 1st, 1932, to Aug. 31st, 1933, totalled \$512,250.00 at standard rate for gold, the actual premium being another \$112,918.00. During the month of August an average of 340 tons per day was milled. Profit on present operations is said to run around \$25,000.00 per month, before depreciation, depletion and deductions for taxes. The official estimate of broken ore in stopes is given as 35,000 tons with a net worth of \$10,000.00. Underground work is proceeding with excellent results. The mine appears to be very efficiently managed and to be making good in very pleasing way.
