Former Whelpdale Property to be Developed at Early Date

Empire Gold Mines Limited to Develop Whelpdale, Gold Ridge and Other Properties Near the Hollinger and McIntyre Mines. New and Up-to-date Mining Plant to be Installed. Financial Arrangements Now Under Way

At present there appears to be an excellent chance of properties lying within a distance of half a mile from the town of Timmins being developed at an early date. These properties include the former Whelpdale property, the Gold Ridge claims and an additional 40-acre claim formerly owned by the Ontario-Guibord Mining Company. In all there is a total of some 300 acres of valuable mining ground on the north side of Gillies Lake and facing both the Hollinger and McIntyre Mines. These properties are now owned by the Empire Gold Mines, Limited,

efforts have been made to acquire the adjoining properties of the Gold Ridge and the Ontario-Guibord claim. In the last few weeks the Empire Gold Mines, Limited, succeeded in acquiring the Gold Ridge Mine and other properties of the Ontario-Guibord Mining Company, Limited. The president, E. H. Walker, and the vice-president, A. S. Fuller, must feel considerable satisfaction in being at last able to announce the compact and valuable mining area owned by the Empire Gold Mines, Limited, after the time, effort and investment necessary to reach this happy position. Up to the present time all the stock of the Empire Gold Mines, Limited, has been closely held by mining interests and the company is making its first initial public offering of 500,000 shares with the plan of financing preliminary work at the property. With the properties under one ownership and management it is intended to centralize all future mining operations and thus assure the most economical development. There was a shaft put down on the Whelpdale years ago, the shaft going down 120 feet. A certain amount of lateral work was also done, and in connection with this a small mining plant was installed. On the Gold Ridge former owners put a shaft down approximately 100 feet and it is understood that at this depth good commercial ore was encountered. In the work on the Whelpdale it was reported that several veins on that property extended over and on to the adjoining Gold Ridge. In addition to the two shafts down on the amalgamated property a number of open cuts and test pits have been put down on surface veins. For some time work was carried on at the Whelpdale with satis-

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factory results reported but the advent of war stopped operations. At the time the Hollinger and McIntyre and adjacent properties were staked prospectors could not locate on either the Whelpdale or Gold Ridge, these being Veteran Grant claims. Good reports have been received in regard to the Whelpdale and Gold Ridge from experts of the standing of A. R. Whitman, geologist, Hamlin Brooks Hatch, Hugh B. Lee, E.M., H. W. Darling, E.M., and John W. Shaw, E.M. In addition to the reports, the results of work done, the geology, and other favourable factors, the new owners of the amalgamated property no doubt feel that the location is in itself an unusually encouraging feature. The location also is of value in regard to any work done on the property, the close proximity to railway, power, road systems and the municipality of Timmins making the location particularly convenient from every viewpoint. On the other hand, if work is undertaken at the property that fact will be of undoubted advantage to the town of Timmins and the district. The off-

cers and directors of the Empire Gold Mines, Limited, are well known in the Porcupine being largely the same group that is interested in the Paymaster Mine. The president is E. H. Walker; vice-president, A. S. Fuller; second vice-president, J. A. Frolock; treasurer, Chas. E. Cooke; secretary, E. L. O'Reilly, barrister and solicitor, Toronto; director, H. D. Rothwell, B.A.Sc., Toronto. The opening of the Empire Gold Mines, Limited, will be looked forward to with interest and anticipation. Many held high hopes of the Whelpdale. The amalgamated properties should present a much more promising outlook for the development of another mine almost within the limits of Timmins.

Death on Friday of Mrs. P. J. Beaudin

Long Resident in the Porcupine Camp. The Late Mrs. Beaudin was Highly Esteemed by All. Death Came Suddenly and Unexpectedly.

The sudden and unexpected death of Mrs. Peter J. Beaudin, 112 Cedar street, north, on Friday morning last, Nov. 24th, came as a shock to wide circles of friends and acquaintances in Timmins and the Porcupine. She had been troubled a little recently with high blood pressure, but had not been ill until Thursday afternoon when she was suddenly stricken. Despite all that medical and nursing skill and care could do, Mrs. Beaudin failed to rally, and passed away on Friday morning without having regained consciousness.

SENTENCED TO JAIL TERM FOR PERJURY IN COURT

Perjury is sometimes punished in this country. It is not altogether as uncommon as might be desired to run across cases of perjury. Very often, however, nothing is done about it. There was a case, or rather, two cases at Amos, Quebec, last week when Gerard Thoin, Francois Beaudin and J. Bordeleau, all of La Rein, Que., were sentenced on Monday of this week to three months' imprisonment on charges of perjury. The three men referred to were each convicted of giving false testimony at the trial of Reel Starnaud on a charge of attempted criminal assault on a girl.

"If the north could be put in the hands of an honorary advisory board of competent notherners who know the territory and its needs from actual residence, more progress could be made," James M. "There is too much politics for the good of the north, and always has been," he said. "The Governments, people and the press of Ontario have been most sympathetic in their attitude. The trouble is we don't seem to be able to get them to take us seriously."

Algoma, a district of vast resources, is practically as much a suburb of Toronto as York County, he averred. The Soo is reached easily and yet many people in Toronto knew as little of Algoma "as they do of the centre of Africa."

HERE'S YOUR RECIPE
 Let's Go Old-Fashioned this year and Make Our Own!
 3 cups sifted Swiss meringue
 1 cup cake flour
 2 teaspoons bicarbonate
 1 teaspoon soda
 2 teasp. on cinnamon
 2 teaspoons nutmeg
 2 cups butter
 8 eggs yokes well beaten
 1 1/2 cups milk
 1 cup sour milk
 1 cup grape juice
 6 cups raisins
 1 1/2 cups currants
 1 1/2 cups figs, chopped
 1 1/2 cups nuts, finely cut
 2 cups apples, chopped
 4 cups nut meats, chopped
 8 egg whites, stiffly beaten
 Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, and spices, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, and cream and milk. Combine raisins, currants, figs, and nuts, and mix with the mixture. Add then molasses and beat well. Then add 1/2 of flour with this mixture. Bake grape juice, mixed with whites. Remaining flour in egg whites. Pour into two well-greased loaf pans, 8 x 4 x 3 inches, lined with wrapping paper, in slow oven (300 F.) 4 hours.
