### Ten-Minute Limit on O.H.A. Overtime Play

Ontario Hockey Association Makes Change in Regard to Overtime Play. Also to Put Stop to Rough Hockey.

A despatch on Saturday from Toronto says that lengthy overtime periods are over in Ontario hockey games. This was decided says the despatch by the Ontario Hockey Association meeting at Toronto on Saturday when they put into effect a rule which limits overtime play to one period of 10 minutes. Only exception to this rule is in the case of playoff games where goals count on the round. These will be played until the tie is broken.

The decision to cut overtime brought to an end a rule which had been in effect for the last 20 years and which allowed a 30-minute prolongation of the game.

The O.H.A. also decided to put an end to rough hockey and passed a rule suspending for one game any player who fights on the ice. An additional penalty may be added, according to the gravity of the offence. Any player who attacks the referee is liable for indefinite suspension.

Teams playing out of town games will in future pay their own expenses, the home team paying the referee, an amendment governing travelling teams provided. In the event of the home team not playing a return game, however, it will pay the other club 15 cents a mile for 10 men.

### Brief Police Court Session This Week

Only Nine Charge on the Docket at Tuesday's Session of Police Court. Charge Against Maxine Morin Withdrawn. Other Cases

There was only a small police court this week. There were but nine cases on the docket on Tuesday, which is much below the recent average number. The Kingston hotel proprietor was charged with two offences against the liquor laws—one of having liquor not on his permit and the other of keeping liquor for sale. Both cases were remanded to next week.

The charge of indecent assault against Maxine Morin, Wilson avenue, was withdrawn. His wife, who had laid the charge against him, failed to appear.

Arthur Thibault, 3 Maple street north was charged with having liquor not on his permit. He was fined \$100.00 and costs, the fine being paid.

For drinking in a public place a young man was fined \$25.00 and costs, a total of \$40.50. This fine was also paid.

There were two solitary drunk charges, each being fined \$10.00 and costs.

A couple of highway traffic cases were remanded until next week.

### Latchford Man Dies from Fall in Well

Geo. H. Knight Succumbs to Injuries While en Route to Hospital at Cobalt on Sunday Last.

Injuries sustained when he stepped back, while working in a well, to avoid a falling stone which had slipped from the rope by which it was being lowered, proved fatal at Latchford on Sunday evening to George Harvey Knight, about 40 years of age, who died while en route by truck to Cobalt municipal hospital for treatment. Hemorrhage of the brain, caused by a probable fracture of the skull, sustained when Knight struck his head against the cribbing of the well, caused death, which occurred some 33 hours after the accident.

No inquest will be held, Coroner Dr. W. C. Arnold, of Halleybury, decided after consultation with Crown Attorney Smiley. The authorities learned that Knight was 20 feet below surface and standing on stones six feet from the bottom of the well.

Knight fell to the bottom of the well after his head struck the stonework, but was able to crawl back to the stones and after being hauled to surface by rope, walked home.

Dr. G. E. Case, of Cobalt, saw Knight Saturday afternoon and again on Sunday, and both times the man appeared to be resting comfortably, with no indication of serious developments. Late yesterday afternoon, the doctor was called when Knight became worse and he ordered the patient removed to Cobalt, but the man died before hospital was reached.

Knight, employed by the T. & N. O. Railway as night pump-man at Latchford, leaves a widow and six children. His father and other relatives reside in the Clute section, near Cochrane.
