The annual general meeting of the Timmins Horticultural Society was held in the town hall on Monday evening, Jan. 15th, for the election of officers for the ensuing year and other business. The Horticultural Society had a decided surprise when they found the hall packed to the doors. It looked like the biggest attendance ever turning out to an annual meeting of the society. It turned out, however, that the big crowd had gathered, believing there was a council meeting to be held. When the nature of the meeting was discovered a great part of the big crowd left the hall. Enough of the members and others interested in horticulture remained to make a good attendance for the annual meeting.
