Pasteurized Milk of Value to Community

Universal Adoption Would do Much to Save Lives and Money. Some Striking Facts and Figures on Milk and the Spread of Disease.

At the present moment there are a number of reasons why the question of pasteurized milk should attract very special interest in Timmins and district. Recently The Advance has noted the progress made by the dairies of the district in the matter of a merger...

Nearly twenty years ago the City of Toronto made the pasteurization of its milk supply compulsory. Since that time not a single case of milk-borne tuberculosis has come into the Sick Children's hospital from Toronto...

During that period there have been no epidemics of typhoid fever or other milk-borne diseases in Toronto, but there have been a number of such epidemics in other communities where pasteurization of milk has not been compulsory...

Such disease producing germs may be derived from the cow itself, which may be suffering from tuberculosis, mastitis or contagious abortion, while other germs, like those of typhoid fever and diphtheria, may come from the excretions of the milker who fails to live up to a reasonable standard of cleanliness...

When municipalities can protect themselves from milk-borne disease by the simple process of heating the milk to 140 to 145 degrees Fahrenheit and holding it there for a limited period of time, it seems strange that there should be any opposition to this process. As to the change in the food value of the milk resulting from pasteurization—elaborate investigations in the feeding of animals and children have clearly shown that this elevation of temperature does not adversely affect the nutritional value of the milk in any way...

Decision Made to Build Mill on Tashota Property

Word from Toronto last week was to the effect that officials of the Tashota Goldfields Limited announced that financing arrangements were completed with responsible people to install a 25-ton mill on the company's property at Tashota and to de-water workings and develop the ore indicated by previous work.

Miners Limited have been engaged by the company to supervise and manage the property and they are sending a crew in immediately to get the plant in shape and de-water the mine when a complete geological examination and check sampling will be made by Minefinders' engineers and geologists...

Ore estimates are contained in three veins. "A" has 3,113 tons, \$58,026; "C" 3,348 tons, \$43,457; "D" 9,000 tons \$190,620. Values are at \$35 an ounce. Estimates are based on surface and 200 foot level work and show shoots from 35 to 140 feet in length, four to five feet wide.

Canyon Power Nets \$64,500 in 5 Months

Total Revenue from Abitibi Canyon Power Development was \$125,097 in Five Months, Hon. J. R. Cooke Tells Legislature.

First five months operation of the first unit of the Abitibi Canyon power development brought the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission revenue totalling \$125,097. Hon. J. R. Cooke, chairman of the commission, revealed in the legislature Friday last.

Among the assets acquired by the commission was a plant upon which \$15,146,607 in cash had been expended, and \$2,697,392 unexpended cash in the hands of the Montreal Trust Co., trustee under the mortgage, to secure the bonds of the Ontario Power Service Corporation.

During the same period the cost of operation was \$60,554.

A number of claims of contractors and other creditors of the Ontario Power Service Corporation are in process of settlement, Mr. Cooke said.

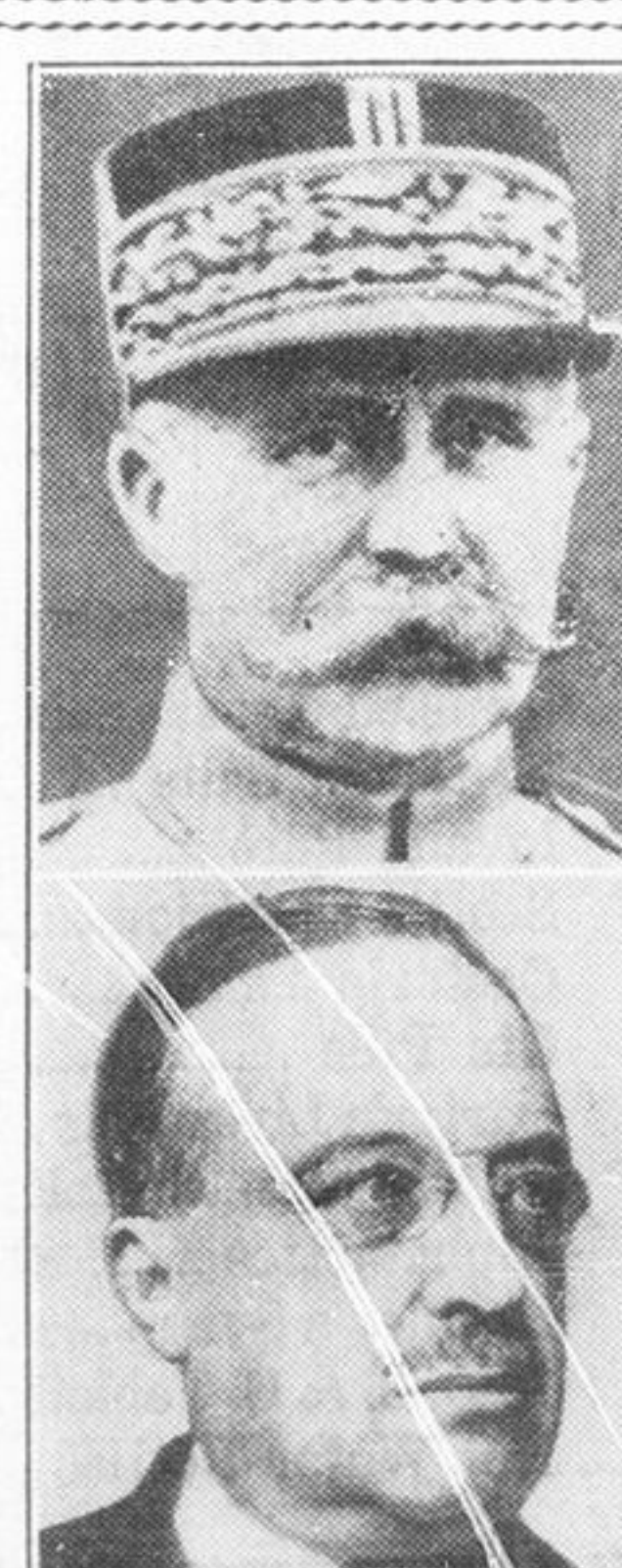
Details of revenue and operating costs of the enterprise were from the commencement of the operation of the first unit on May 25, 1933, until October 31.
