

# South Porcupine Win the Second Championship of the Group

## Won Friday Evening's Game at South Porcupine with the Score of 6 to 1. Thus Taking the Round, 9 to 2. Timmins Put up Lively Game Friday Night but were Out-classed by the Porkies. Some Notes of the Game.

South Porcupine, Ont., Feb. 28th, 1934. Special to The Advance.

The superiority of the Porkies was never better illustrated than in Friday night's game when they won the home game of the play-offs 6-1 and the round 9-2. They looked the better team all the way and at no time did they underestimate the power of the Huskies, and they had plenty. Timmins went into the game with a two-goal deficit but they were undaunted; they played consistently hard, and made the Porkies earn every goal.

Play opened fast and furious with Taylor getting the first shot on Quinn who turned it aside. In the first five minutes there were only four shots on goal, play alternating between the blue lines with both defences unbeatable. At five and a half minutes, Goat Smith was sent to the cooler for tripping Arundel who carried the puck from the face-off to be checked by Dunn who broke fast and passed to Maki for the local's first counter at six minutes. With Smith back on the ice, Taylor was banished for tripping Arundel, and the Huskies pressed hard but couldn't beat Esseltine who made some spectacular saves. Tremblay drew the next penalty for tripping Cattarello but the period ended without further scoring.

Most of the excitement came in the second period when Auger broke away and shot on Esseltine who saved but lost his stick which was kicked aside in the scramble which followed. He made three additional saves before Arundel finally heaved the rubber in the net for Timmins' lone counter. It was a smart piece of work by Esseltine and without a stick he didn't have a chance. Thirty seconds later Maki went in from the face-off to notch another counter for the locals. There was no

further scoring and Godin and Smith collected the only two penalties of the game.

Timmins went into the offensive from the face-off in the third period and had some nice shots on Esseltine who did some smart net-mending. Seven minutes from the opening Michaelson scored for the Porkies and three minutes later Huggins and Smith went through for a beautiful counter. With Timmins playing all men up the locals had but to beat and score. Thomas counted at sixteen minutes and thirty seconds and at eighteen minutes Dunn who was playing splendid hockey netted the sixth goal for the Porkies to complete the scoring.

There were six penalties in the third Taylor and Godin collecting majors for a fistful encounter.

Auger and Arundel were the best for Timmins while the local stars were Maki, Huggins and Cattarello with Esseltine playing a stellar game in goal. The game was very capably handled by Referee Roger Mitchell of Sudbury.

Timmins—Goal, Quinn; defence, Porter and Godin; forwards, Arundel, Auger and Walsh; alternates, Tremblay, Godin, Kennedy and Smith.

South Porcupine—Goal, Esseltine; defence, Smith, Taylor and Dunn; forwards, Huggins, Maki and McArthur; alternates, Cattarello, Michaelson and Thomas.

### Reply to Workless by Tisdale Council

Reeve Callacher Clearly Outlines the Situation. To Petition for Liquor Vendors' Store at South Porcupine. Other Council Business.

South Porcupine, Ont., Feb. 28th, 1934. Special to The Advance.

At the regular council meeting held on Monday in the council chamber, all members of the council, save the reeve, were present.

A very large delegation of unemployed were present to ask the council to rescind the order whereby all single men were to be out of relief on March 1st. The leader was given a very fair hearing, and all who had anything to say were encouraged to speak.

The reeve made a speech to them which seemed to strike the right note. "It is not your fault that you are in this condition," he said, "the unemployment situation is grave all over the country, but you must be fair in your demands. Instead of standing back and saying, 'Our neighbours must keep us,' show some spirit in trying to help yourselves." Be fair with the people who are paying taxes; many of them are just struggling along themselves. You are not living on the council. We are only handling business for the taxpayers. It is on your neighbours you are living. You can make an earnest effort to help yourselves; if you then fall down, come to the council and state your case."

The letter read as follows:—"At the meeting of the unemployed of South Porcupine it was decided to ask a continuance of the relief or work at a monthly rate of \$35, with clothes to be furnished by the township if work is given. We ask you gentlemen of the council to consider that to eliminate relief at this particular time of the year, will create considerable hardship in so far as the unemployed are concerned. We also ask you to consider that present rates for bushwork are not sufficient to give a living wage, meaning piece work rates, hence the demand for a monthly rate. Those demands if granted to apply to all unemployed living in South Porcupine."

The routine business was gone through, relief accounts, salaries, wages and an amendment to the water by-law.

It was also decided to send a petition to the Liquor Control Board regarding the establishing of a vendors' store at South Porcupine.

### Police Court Cases at South Porcupine

Three Men and a Woman Create Some Disorder in Tisdale, Timmins Sends Officers, Another Case with Odd Angle.

On Sunday last Chief McInnis phoned the Schumacher police that a car or truck was in the ditch at the bottom of the Rea Hill, the driver of which was supposed to be drunk. Constables Pulton and Douglas came out from Schumacher and followed the truck in to South Porcupine. The driver of the

truck drove right through South End, (taking no notice of the police car's warning horn), to Whitney township, behind the station, where, according to officers in police court this morning, the truck stopped, and when the policemen attempted to seize a bottle of liquor, both a woman in the car, they were held back by two of the men, while the woman managed to get out of the truck and empty the bottle of "evidence" in a snow-bank.

No arrests were made then, but the constables reported to the chief who made out warrants for the arrests of the parties concerned. The chief then went to Allan street, where the parties were, and in order to have no trouble named to Timmins to send two policemen to augment the force here. Timmins sent four.

Arrests were then made of three men and charge of obstructing unlawfully and wilfully officers of the law in the execution of their duties was laid.

These men were arraigned before Magistrate Atkinson this morning—also the woman concerned. Conflicting evidence was given but the magistrate found the three men guilty and reserved sentence till next week. The woman was granted a week's adjournment. The men are now in South Porcupine jail.

The case of a party from Schumacher charged with having liquor in other than his place of residence was adjourned for further witnesses.

This case presented an uncommon angle. When the man was asked why he wanted to have so much alcohol, his excuse was that, having been wounded overseas, he used the stuff to poultice his leg at times when changes of temperature caused it to ache!
