



Britain Follows the Parliamentary Way

Old Land Method is to Trust to Demoeratic Government to Remedy Economic and Industrial Ills.

A thoughtful reader of The Advance has directed attention to a recent editorial in the weekly edition of The London Times of recent date, the editorial having the title of "The Parliamentary Way." The editorial seems to be particularly timely at the present moment, in view of discussions on democratic forms of government as contrasted with the dictator type new prevailing in a majority of the larger countries of the world. The Time's touches on a point referred to in a recent issue of The Advance, namely. that if democratic government is to survive in britain or elsewhere it must be active in leadership and control. "It would be a mistake," says The Times, "to suppose that this country has a monopoly of affection for representative institutions and enjoys the certainty that here alone they will survive automatically or without response to the perils of a new age." In other words, it might be said that if the majority desire to retain the right to rule, then the majority must exercise that right and not allow any minority to steal that right, either by force, threat of force, or cajolery.

The address of Sir Arthur Balfour at Timmins last week gives the editorial from The Times a special significance. Sir Arthur mentioned briefly the British idea of government by parliament rather than by forms of dictatorship.





"There is every reason to believe that this country can and must give its own answer in its own way to its new problems, and that the answer can and should comprise the continued genuine use of parliament. As Mr. Baldwin pointed out, we cannot, even if we would, "move at the same pace in economic experiments" as other countries which, at a pinch, can feed themselves and he might have added the other striking difference that we had already moved far before some countries had started to move at all. Few even of the economic problems are new to us. All have been pondered and treated for at least half a generation, and many for much longer. We have evolved and are still evolving a financial, economic, and political system which is quite as capable of meeting them in theory and much better suited to meet them in our own special circumstances. This is true judged even by the test that justification shall be by works and not by faith-a test which is wholly accepted by the members of the present Government. 

From the rough draft an approxi-Bureau now running weekly in The mate cost of the new home can be estimated and any necessary change of plan (consequent upon cost, or conformity to the type of design chosen) adopted; thus avoiding misunderstandings which might otherwise occur as the project develops. Having seen in black and white, a house according to his taste, the owner can authorize final working drawings and specifications. The success of the building depends considerably on their careful and accurate preparation.

Specifications serve to interpret the drawings more explicitly and are divided into different allotments. For instance, the masonry specification describes the character of masonry material, the type of mortar and the proportions of cement, sand and gravel To avoid "extras" and misunderstandings see that your specifications definitely state your expectations and requirements. Remember that afterthoughts are costly. The economical time to have things done is when the men are on the job working at their trade according to an orderly building schedule. 




