## Provincial Police on Guard at Camps

About Twenty of the Provincial Force Gathered at Kapuskasing Where Threats of Trouble Brewing were Reported.

About fifteen or twenty provincial police in charge of Inspector F. B. Creasy, of Halleybury, have been at Kapuskasing for the past week or so to prevent trouble in the lumber camps in that area. There have been persistent reports that trouble was brewing and the provincial police are on the scene to avoid any difficulty. Some time ago, as noted in The Advance, the men at the lumber camps in the Kapuskasing area presented a set of demands touching on wage scales, working conditions and organization of labour unions, etc. The demands made seemed to be pretty stiff and there was doubt as to whether the company could accede to the demands or whether the demands were made with the idea of being accepted. At the time the demands were presented the company did not make any definite reply and since then it is apparent that the demands are not to be granted. A considerable number of the men have been paid off from different camps in the district and these are said to have gathered at Kapuskasing. It is reported that others of the men are continuing at their work in the bush and are apparently ready to continue at work if not interfered with. In the meantime there have been so many reports of plans under way in regard to getting all the men out of the woods or preventing others from going in, unless the list of demands is met, that police protection was arranged for the area in the general interests. Some of the provincial officers are stationed at the different camps, while a half a dozen are being held in reserve in case they may be needed in any particular place. There is a general hope that no trouble will result in the Kapuskasing area. The provincial police are popular with the men in general having a name for playing fairly and unless agitators start something no difficulty is anticipated. The presence of the provincial police is hoped to have the effect of averting any disorder that may be planned by any irresponsible.

## Timmins Cases at the Supreme Court

Edith Polkki, formerly of Kirkland Lake, but who had been living for some months in Timmins, was found lying across the bed in a room in the hotel with bullet wounds in her right arm, in her chin and in the left side of the head near the ear. She was bleeding profusely and was apparently in critical condition. Graham, who had come here from Kirkland Lake where he had been acquainted with Mrs. Polkki, was in the room. Mrs. Polkki told the police that Graham had shot her and Graham did not deny this. He appeared very repentant and while in jail at Timmins was so melancholy and depressed that he was constantly watched to prevent him attempting his own life. At the hospital here Mrs. Polkki hovered between life and death for a few days and then made a good recovery. At Cochrane this week she appeared fully recovered except that she has been left somewhat deaf in one ear. Graham, who is 33 years of age and unmarried, became acquainted with Mrs. Polkki when she was living at Kirkland Lake with her husband, who was employed at one of the mines there. Graham came to Timmins in the spring of 1933, sleeping at the police station for a few nights but later getting a job at the McIntyre and having a room on Fourth avenue. Mrs. Polkki came to Timmins in the summer. On the day of the shooting Mrs. Polkki came to the hotel where Graham had secured a room the night before. She enquired for the room by number and later the housekeeper at the hotel was alarmed at cries of "Don't shoot me!" followed by the sound of shots. The police were notified and had the injured woman removed to the hospital while Graham was arrested. Mrs. Polkki is of Swedish descent while her husband is Finnish.

### Additional Classes Being Considered by H.S. Board

The classes would likely start at eight o'clock in the morning and continue until 5 p.m. with the noon hour taken up with classes, the pupils attending on the "shift" plan as it were. The matter has to be taken up with the Dept. of Education and also have very serious consideration by the board on account of the many reactions to the plan. With the additional attendance expected and the desire to avoid further building of school accommodation, it is felt that some plan must be evolved. Under the plan being considered it would be necessary to engage from 5 to 7 additional teachers, but this would likely prove less costly than additional building with further teaching staff as well.
