Nothing but Truth is Truthfully Given

Clever Three-Act Play Effectively Presented Under Auspices of Young People's Society of United Church. Calls for Repeating.

On Wednesday and Thursday evenings of last week the three-act play, "Nothing But the Truth," was presented in the United Church hall under the auspices of the Young People's Society. Both nights the hall was crowded to capacity and all attending were delighted with the clever play and the talented way in which it was presented. There were many happy and witty

lines in the play and a succession of amusing situations, and each and every member of the cast did his or her part so effectively that the full value of the play was presented. The big audiences enjoying its presentation were free with their comments on the success of the presentation. There have been a number of requests to have the play repeated. Among these has been an invitation to put on the play at North Porcupine. For the very successful presentation of the play here and the finished performance given, as well as the stage settings and effects, much credit is due to each of the capable cast and to Gerald A. Gordon, the director and Harold F. Burt, the stage manager.

In a brief curtain speech on Thursday evening, Jerry Roach, president of the Young People's Society, thanked the audience for their attendance, and also gave deserved words of praise to all taking part in the successful presentation.

It is nothing but the truth to say that "Nothing but the Truth" as presented last week was an unusually clever play presented with notable effectiveness and with unusual finish and skill, each and every member of the cast taking the part assigned with remarkable ability. The plot of the play deals with a wager that called for one member of a firm of stock-brokers to tell the absolute truth for a period of twenty-four

hours. The result is a series of very humorous situations with an array of philosophical lines and amusing developments. While every one in the cast may be noted as specially effective Jerry Roach, Rev. Bruce Millar, Farquhar Anglin and Roy Hardy were outstanding. The other members of the cast gave the fullest support, each taking his or her part with a natural skill that made the play notable in its effectiveness.

 "Dick Donnelly," a young man about town, working for "E. M. Ralston," Roy Hardy taking this role in natural and easy way that added to its value.
 "Robert Bennett," young businessman with a conscience, and in love with "Ralston's" daughter, the part being so naturally filled that it was doubly effective. Taken by Jerry Roach.
 "Mrs. E. M. Ralston," the social climbing wife of "Ralston," an effective portrayal by Miss Alice Smith.

"Ethel Clark," emotional daughter of a wealthy man, well done by Miss Isabel Leng.

"Gwendolyn Ralston," daughter of Ralston and in love with "Bob," Miss Betty Paterson taking this important role with her usual ability and effectiveness.

"Sabel Jackson" and "Mabel Jackson," two chorus girls, gold-diggers, and free and easy, well portrayed by Miss Evelyn Church and Miss Jean Fortin.

"Martha," the maid, a small part perfectly presented by Miss Edith Hill.

On Wednesday evening Miss Edna Connor added to the pleasure of the evening by piano selections. On Thursday evening there were appreciated piano numbers by Mrs. J. W. Faithful, while a violin number played with talent by David Gordon won much merited applause. Special mention should also be made of the talent shown by Miss Jean Gordon in playing the piano accompaniment for her brother.
