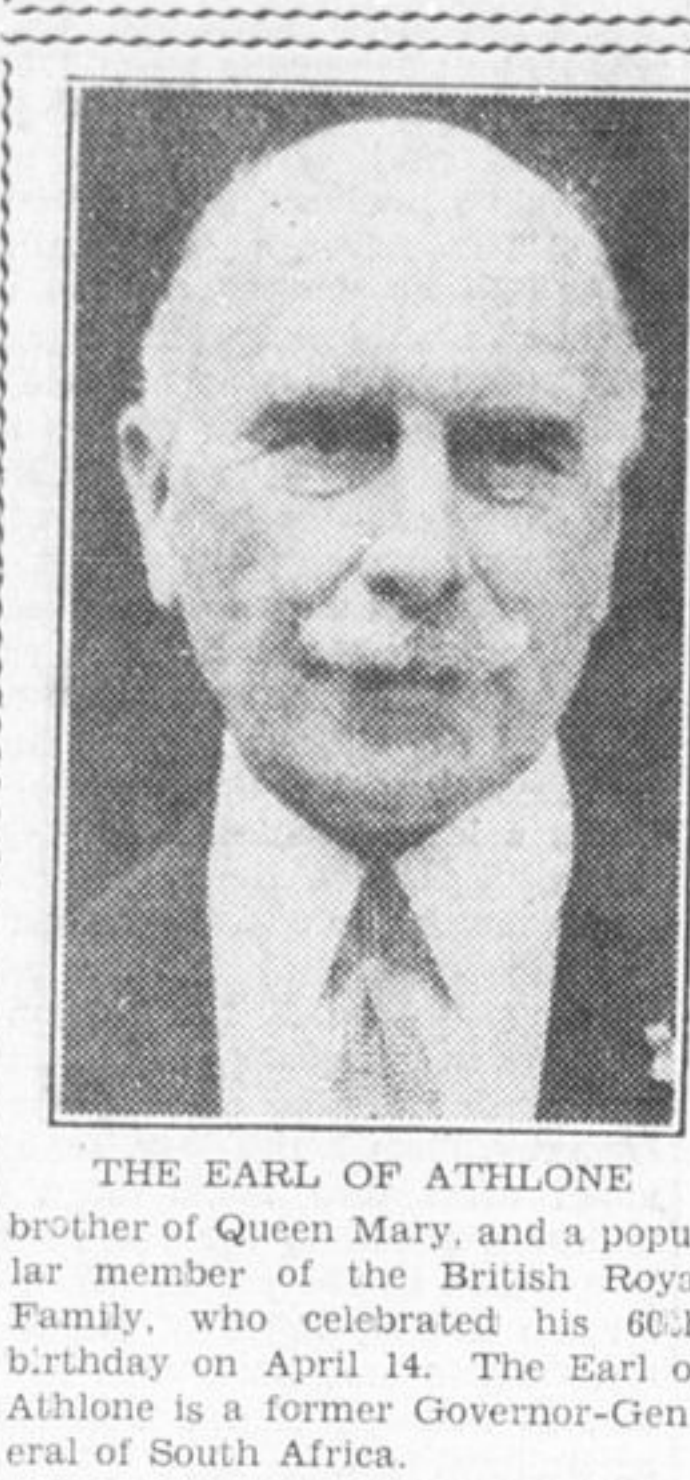
Ambulance Brigade Hold Pleasing Event

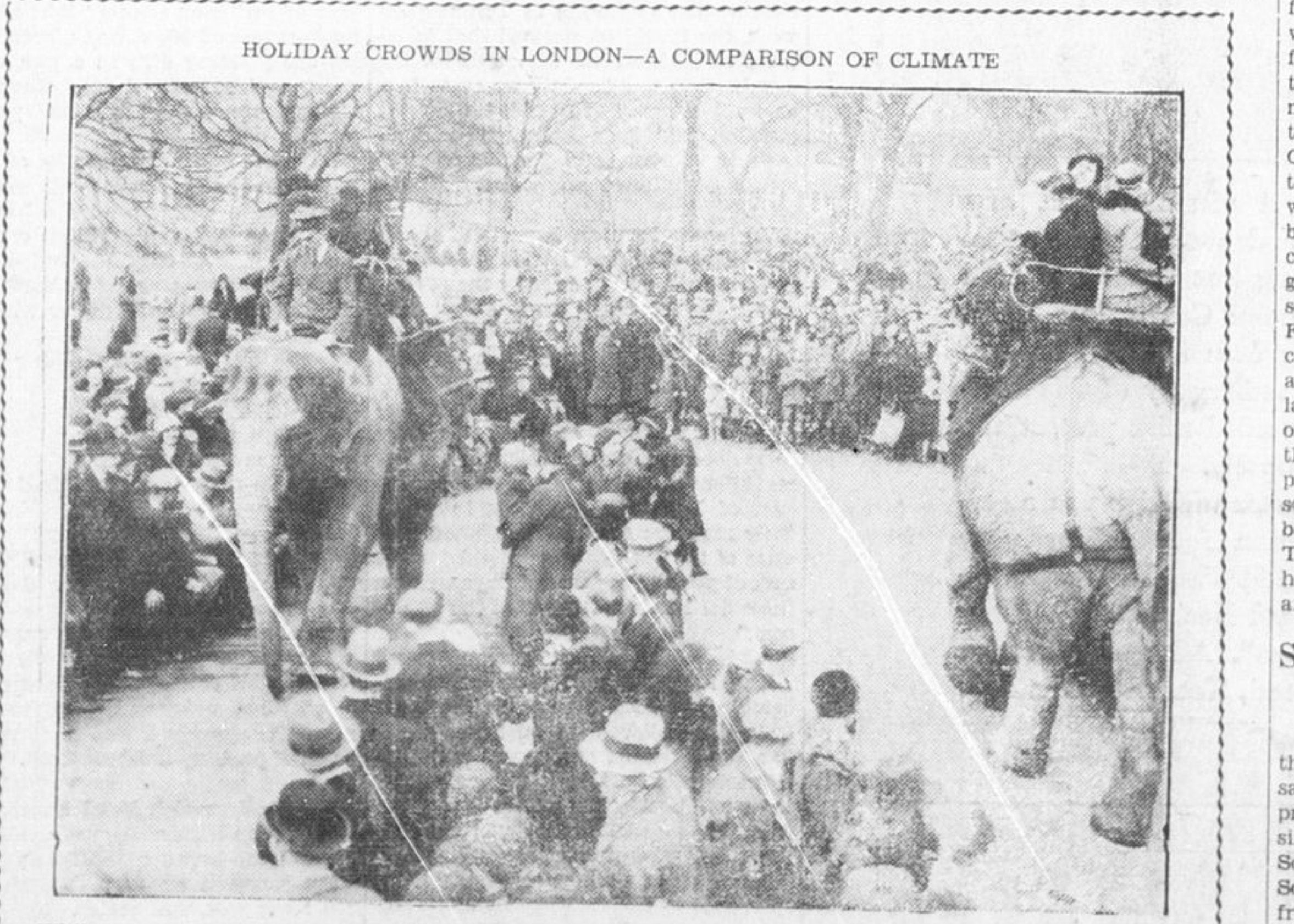
Refreshments were served, and this part of the programme was specially enjoyed.
