Mines Lead Canada Back to Prosperity

Higher Price Obtainable for Gold has Given Mining Big Stimulus. Value of Mining Industry to Canada Shown.

The following article by Hon. Chas. McCrean, Minister of Mines for Ontario, in a recent issue of The Ottawa Journal should be of special interest and value: Mining has developed in a notable way.

Mining has become an integral part of the industrial and commercial life of Ontario, and it is as essential to our prosperity today as agriculture and lumbering were a generation ago. Based upon an increasing knowledge of geological conditions and practical experience in mining and metallurgical methods, gold mining in Ontario has developed into a highly profitable and an established industry.

Unlike other industries which are governed by a fluctuating demand for their commodities, gold mining has a ready and a rising market for its product. The advance in the price of gold to \$35 per ounce enhanced the value of our resources. The ore reserves of our producing mines have not only been increased in value, but also in volume, by enabling the miner to develop ore that was not profitable under the standard value of gold.

Never in the history of Ontario has there been greater activity in actual development work than that which is going forward among our new and older mines at the present time. New shaft-houses and mills are appearing on our northern horizon and new communities are springing up in the midst of the wilderness.

It should not require any special pleading on my part to convince readers of the importance of developing our gold resources at this time. While it is part of my duty as Minister of Mines to present the claims of the industry to the support of capital, my appeal is not merely to self-interest, but rather on behalf of national prosperity and the welfare of the people of Canada as a whole.

Revival in industrial activity is also being reflected in increased production by the nickel-copper mines at Sudbury. The amount of ore smelted by these mines in 1933 was 1,523,414 tons, as compared with 793,552 tons in 1932.

National Recovery National recovery is now under way in Canada, and I believe that our gold mining industry is largely responsible for the revival of confidence which is evidenced in the release of capital and the consequent increase in purchasing power.

Members of the Yugoslav-Canadian Association of Sudbury, an organization with 83 members, have made emphatic objection to their national flag being carried in the red May Day parade at Sudbury. In addition to making it known that they consider the carrying of the Yugoslav flag in a red parade to be an insult and a misrepresentation, they are announcing that if anything of the sort happens again they will take steps to make it very unpleasant for those responsible.

On May Day the association approached Mayor Brodie, of Sudbury, and asked for police neutrality while they broke up the parade and broke up the paraders as well. They considered the use of the Yugoslav flag in a red parade as a desecration of the ensign of their country. "They're not going to carry that flag again," the president of the Yugoslav-Canadian Association is quoted as saying.

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It might surprise some people to know how many Canadians who may be classed as "foreigners" feel the same way as the Yugoslav-Canadian Association at Sudbury. There is a large majority of the alien-born who are loyal to Canada and who deeply resent the malice of the reds and their treachery to the land that is giving them a comfortable living.

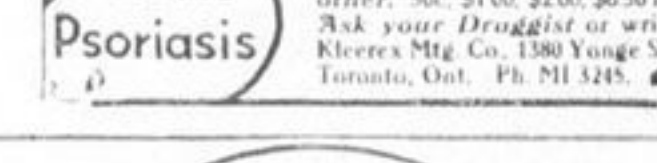

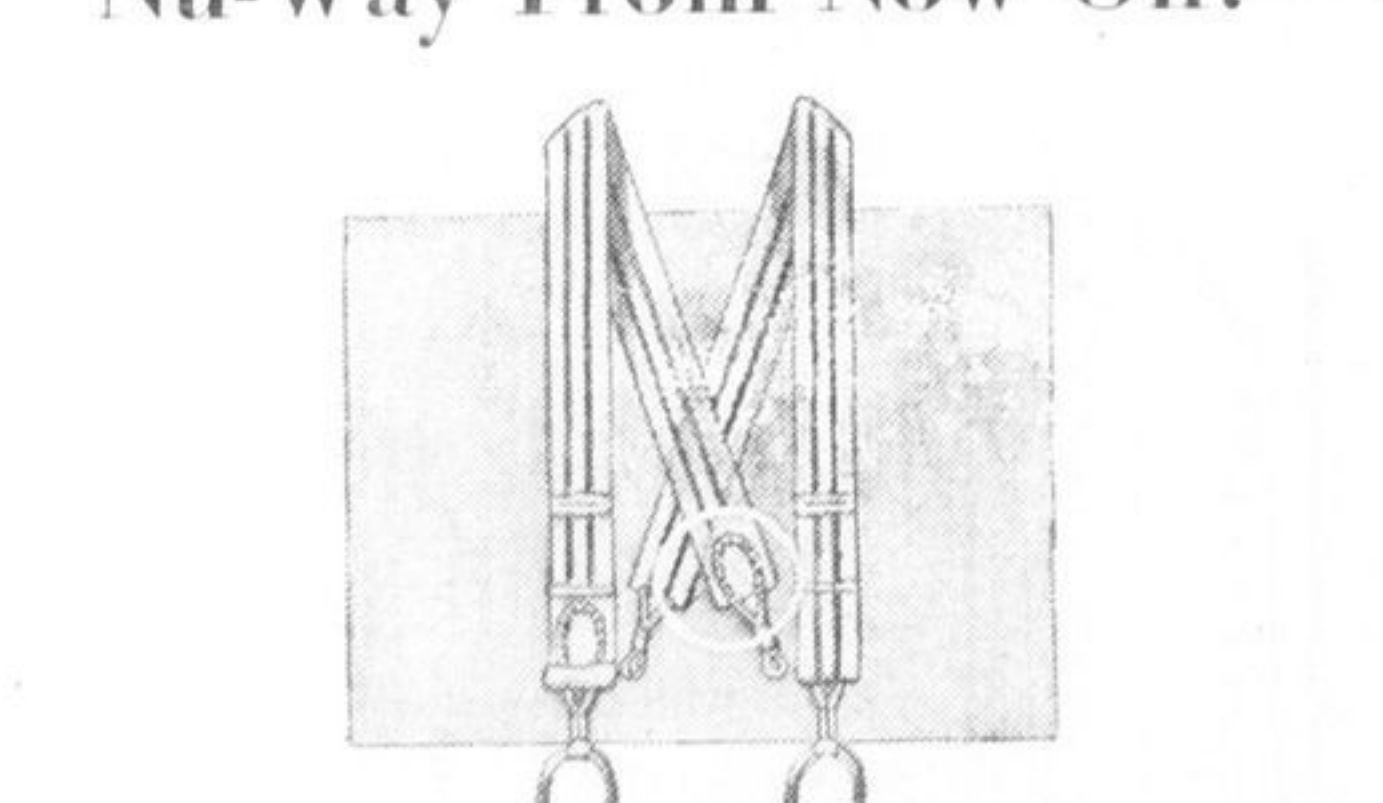
