Large Shipment of Pickerel Fry Here

Fish and Game Protective Association Sees to Stocking of Waters of the District, Shipment Reached Here in Fine Shape.

Last week the Porcupine Fish and Game Protective Association received 400,000 pickerel fry for the stocking of the waters of the district. There was a shipment of pickerel fry for Barber's Bay in addition to the stock for closer streams and lakes. The shipment came by express and arrived in firstclass condition. As soon as the fry arrived arrangements were made for the care of the fish until they could be placed in the waters of the district. J. D. Brady, secretary of the Porcupine Fish and Game Protective Association, informed The Advance that over 1,000,-000 pickerel fry had been allotted from the Government hatcheries for the stocking of the waters between the Height of Land and Timmins.
