Dr. S. L. Honey left this week to attend the Ontario Dental Association convention being held this week at the Royal York hotel, Toronto. Dr. Honey motored to the city, being accompanied by Mrs. Honey who will visit in the South for a few days.

The formal opening of the Timmins Golf Club will be to-morrow (Thursday) May 24th. The match will be President vs. Vice-President. In case of unfavourable weather the match will be held on May 26th (Saturday).

The tea and sale of home cooking given in the United church basement on Saturday afternoon under the auspices of the Woman's Missionary Auxiliary proved a very pleasing and successful event, the attendance being large and a neat sum realized.

The Croatians at Rouyn and Noranda have gone on record as opposed to aliens carrying on Soviet propaganda in this country. The chairman of the Croatian Society at Noranda says he is a naturalized British subject and is loyal to this country and its laws and does not wish to be regarded as among the ingrates who make a good living in this country and spend their leisure time trying to stir up strife and injure the land that has been good to them.

Both Noranda and Rouyn councils have passed by-laws to give the two towns early closing of stores on Wednesday afternoons during June, July, August and September. The early closing has worked out well in Timmins for many years past and has been equally successful in other towns in the North. The only "fly in the ointment" here is that some stores carrying groceries, though ostensibly candy stores, do not always observe the spirit of the by-law.

According to reports from Kirkland Lake the police there waited until evening before trying out their new English Bobby helmets. The Timmins police showed more courage, boldly putting on the helmets the first day it was warm enough, though there was still enough snow in sight to make good snowballs. Timmins boys were not tempted to take a shy at the new helmets, or if they were tempted they had the courage and good sense to conquer the impulse. Now everybody is so accustomed to the helmets that the police would no doubt look odd if they owned other headwear on duty.

Reference has been made recently to the fact that the town of Cobalt may enter suit against Hon. F. Latchford to collect alleged arrears of taxes on property owned by the Chief Justice in Cobalt. Arrears are said to have been accumulating for years on a property bought by Hon. Mr. Latchford when he started the practice of law at Cobalt in the early days of the Silver Camp. At the last meeting of the Cobalt town council Hon. Mr. Latchford was given five days to make a settlement or the town would take the matter to the courts.

Another Big Police Court Docket Here

Large Number of Cases with Several Heavy Fines at Court on Tuesday. Cases Have Variety.

Acting Chief R. Paul and Sergt. Holley and staff had another large and varied docket for police court this week.

The cases in the order in which they were dealt with were as follows:—Six ordinary common everyday drunk charges brought \$10.00 and costs each. One other ordinary drunk failed to produce the ten and costs and so went down to Haileybury to-day to start his thirty days. One speeding case was adjourned until called on.

Four others pleaded guilty to speeding and were fined \$10.00 and costs each.

Wm. Splawnick, Balsam street, north, in the building formerly known as the London Cafe, was fined \$200.00 and costs on the charge of having liquor on his permit. He paid.

Kate Onyzuk, Maple street, north, was fined \$200.00 and costs for illegally having liquor. She was fined \$200.00 and costs and the premises were declared public under the meaning of the act. She also paid the fine and costs.

Ferdinand Mayrand, 18 Mountjoy street, was charged with permitting drunkenness. The police found a woman drunk on the premises, as well as some others apparently on the way. Mayrand was fined \$100.00 and costs. He paid.

Nicholas Ferri, arrested last week and charged with illegal possession of both moonshine and high-grade, was remanded a week on each count.

Mike Filo also was remanded a week on a charge of reckless driving. Filo was arrested early Thursday morning on the case of John Tegel who was struck by a car on the highway near the Rochester turn shortly after 11 o'clock on Wednesday night.

Another reckless driving case was adjourned until called upon.

The case of a man charged with issuing a forged cheque on a local merchant was dismissed, good character evidence being given in behalf of the accused and it also being contended that he was the victim of another and not the culprit himself.

A young man was charged with obtaining goods under false pretences from the Consumers' Co-operative Store. The case was withdrawn, satisfactory arrangements apparently having been made.

Increased Cash Assets Shown by Bobjo Mines

Bobjo Mines in its annual report shows an increase in cash position from \$61,963 to \$128,401 as at March 31 last. Robert Jowsey, president, stated that the improvement was brought about largely through the sale of share holdings in other companies, together with capital profits and investment revenue, notwithstanding substantial disbursements in connection with Atlin-Ruffner Mines, Manitoba and Eastern Mines, East Rouyn Gold Mines, etc. Interests in other companies at the end of the fiscal year are set out in the balance sheet at a net figure of \$499,662. Total profits of \$119,608, realized to date on security sales, were transferred to investment reserve.

The president says important transactions during the years were acquisition of controlling interest in the Atlin-Ruffner Mines, a lead-silver proposition in British Columbia, and option on stock control of Manitoba and Eastern Mines.

Included in Bobjo investments are 100,000 shares of San Antonio Mines, carried at cost of \$41,860, present market value, \$382,000; 309,375 shares of God's Lake Gold Mines, carried at a cost of \$5,375; 2,024,433 shares of Atlin-Ruffner Mines at \$511,557, which were acquired during the year for \$17,000 cash and 494,557 shares of Bobjo Mines. Holdings also include 230,333 shares of Manitoba and Eastern Mines, carried at \$14,199.

Stock outstanding amounts to 3,644,062 shares, while another 205,444 shares will be issued upon delivery of further shares of Atlin-Ruffner Mines.

Deficit account, including share discount and amounts written off abandoned properties, amounts to \$2,951,090, which is deducted from par value of shares outstanding, leaving book value of these shares at \$692,972. During the year ended March 31 income of the company totalled \$10,239 and expenses \$9,455, leaving net profit of \$1,794. The annual and a special meeting of shareholders will be held June 6.
