### Expects Big Mine in Central Porcupine

Old-Timer Thinks There's Luck in the Thirteen Claims of Property Adjoining Hollinger, McIntyre and Coniarum.

Writing from South Porcupine this week, H. A. Preston, old-timer of the Porcupine camp and the North, says:—  
"Some people have the idea that thirteen is an unlucky number. But if they found thirteen dollars they would not leave one and take twelve. That would be a time they would say thirteen was lucky. There is a mining company owning thirteen claims directly east and adjoining Hollinger, McIntyre and Coniarum, and southeast they adjoin the Dome. I will bet it is going to be Porcupine's next great mine, for already there has been over two hundred and fifty-four million dollars worth of gold taken from the ground adjoining it on the west, north-west and north, and over sixty million dollars' worth at the south-east of it. The big mines taking out this gold are working directly toward these thirteen claims. The railway and power line pass through it, as well as the auto road, and I am sure that every day the cars are passing over a few more hundred millions beneath them. Twenty-five years ago I wanted my boss to come and prospect right where these 13 claims are, as well as at the lakes around which are two of the world's master mines. It was, as I have said many times, my own thoughts and ideas that resulted in the finding of the Dome a hundred days before my party staked it. I also told the Minister of Mines that a big gold find would some day be made westward from the Young-Davidson at Matachewan, and in less than three months it was made by Bert Ashley. I admit I was wrong in predicting an early spring, but I'll bet I am not wrong in predicting that another big gold mine adjoins the Hollinger on the east. A few years ago I was advising the purchase of Vipond shares at 50c, predicting that they would reach more than a dollar. One young man handed me five hundred dollars to go across the street and buy some for him. In less than eight months Vipond was \$1.25 a share. A year ago Macassa at Kirkland was 20c, and I said she would be in the dollar class soon, and she is near there to-day. I am glad to know that everyone I have ever persuaded to buy mining shares has either doubled his money or at least gained I am positive no one ever lost out on any shares I advised, because I always size up the ground, consider where the claims are located, and who is behind the venture, before I start to talk and advise a buy. I am now predicting the next big mine at Porcupine adjoins the present big one. I am sure I would sooner own the corner across the street from the Royal York than I would a corner two miles up Yonge street. The year 1913 was the time that luck began to grow at Porcupine, and her next mine at present consists of 13 claims (Central Porcupine Mines, Limited) and not one atom or sign of bad luck is on them. Before Jack Frost gets ready for another cold winter you are going to hear some good news. That is the truth."
