At the banquet last week in connection with the 25th anniversary of the discovery of the Porcupine gold mines one of the old-timers noted that it is some time since the original song was published. It was sung to the tune of "Rings on My Fingers, Bells on My Toes." And could the old-timers sing it! Well, you should have heard them. Here is the original song, as written in 1909, the author being no less a personage than the popular Major E. J. Holland, V.C.

Asks for 25,000 Watt Station for North

Jos. A. Bradette, Member for This Riding, Appears Before Radio Committee and Urges Fair Investment for Northern Radio Owners

Jos. A. Bradette, member for this riding of North Temiskaming, appeared before a special meeting of the parliamentary radio committee at Ottawa last week. He urged very forcibly that a 25,000-watt radio station be established by the Government so that the North might receive a fair deal in the matter of radio service. Mr. Bradette explained that a less powerful station than a 25,000-watt one would be of little use. Despatches from Ottawa last week indicate that Mr. Bradette had studied the question very closely and had placed himself in possession of facts and figures that equipped him to give helpful and needed advice in the matter.

The Government owed it to itself and to the nation to give Northern Canada the same advantages as were being enjoyed in other sections of the country, Mr. Bradette said. Northern Canada was in favour of nationalization but at present reception from commission stations was exceedingly bad.

Due to bad reception citizens of Northern Ontario were complaining against the \$2 license fee, and considering the situation in that district Mr. Bradette believed their objections well founded.

The commission should realize there was certain educational work that could be carried on, since many people regarded that body as a purely political agency.

It Takes a Lawyer to Find Money on Kirkland Streets

The "Roving Reporter" writing last week in his column in The Northern News says:—"Some years ago one of Toronto's high-pressure newspapermen visited Kirkland Lake and 'wrote up' the community in a style that actually gave a lot of Old Ontario folk the idea that the streets of Kirkland Lake were paved with money, and that all one had to do to make a living in the town was to go around and pick up the half-dollars and quarters that the denizens of this Height of Land gold camp tossed away in making whoopee each and every night in the week including Sunday. Of course the opposite was the case, and while everybody realizes that Kirkland Lake's riches lie underground for the most part the fact remains that the wealth of the community—in the welfare, health and happiness of its people—is something apart from what lies in the porphyry under the surface of the ground. This is apropos, however, of the fact that money sometimes is to be picked up on Kirkland's sidewalks and pavements and the writer had it called to his attention some days ago when strolling out of F. O'Hearn's Brokerage office with E. W. M. (Pep) Paisley, well-known young Kirkland Lake attorney. The lawyer stopped in his tracks all of a sudden, reached down to the sidewalk, and came up with a dollar bill clutched in his hand!"

Proud to Count N. A. Timmins as a Leader

His Unselfish Attitude Said to Have Had Much Influence in Securing Amendment of Crippling Gold Tax

When the gold tax originally proposed—the taxation of gross production—was first introduced the general opinion was that it would cripple the mining industry in Canada. There was a valiant battle put up by all interested to prevent this. "Gold," the notable "magazine of Canada's North," credits the unselfish attitude of Noah Timmins, president of Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, with having special influence in securing the amendment of the gold tax as originally proposed. In this connection the magazine "Gold" says:—"Bob Jowsey, who labored day and night at Ottawa on behalf of the prospectors and developers, told us of an incident which shows how big is the calibre of at least one Canadian mining magnate.

"When the furor was at its height at Ottawa, Jules Timmins received a cable from Noah Timmins, who was in the tropics, stating that the latter was willing to have the full amount of the proposed gold tax apply to the personal income of the Timmins family rather than to the mines in which they were interested, notably Hollinger and Noranda. This, it is said, would have amounted to about \$2,500,000. Mr. Timmins believed that the tax as originally proposed would be disastrous to the mining industry and he was willing to make a huge personal sacrifice so that mining should not be injured.

"Gold" believes that this offer must have been one of the important influences convincing the government of the sincerity of the mining men's protest. And if there has been a bigger gesture of unselfishness by men with large incomes we should like to hear of it. Certainly the mining men at Ottawa were proud to number Noah Timmins as one of their leaders."

One of the first into the Porcupine in the early days of the rush was Art Booker. He came over the trail from Kelso (Mileage 222) in October, 1909, prospecting and staking claims to the south of Golden City. In 1910 and 1911 he prospected in the west and south-west of the area, staking claims in Turnbull, Carswell, Geikie, Bartlett, etc. In 1912 he became a resident of Timmins, one of the first in the town, and has been here ever since.

The Porcupine gold camp is putting on a grand two weeks' celebration to honour its 25th anniversary as a place on the map. Timmins is doing things in style to make the event a memorable one, and visitors will find a lot to interest them while the carnival spirit holds sway. It was after the building of the T. and N. O. had started from North Bay, in the face of much knocking of the North as an almost useless and unproductive area, that the discoverer of the famous Hollinger mine made his great strike. Cobalt held the spotlight then as a wonder camp turning out silver. The other prospectors who came on farther in their restless quest for good showings were scoffed at, and had a hard life of it at that time, as the railroad was a long way off and packing supplies through the bush was no fun. But when Benny Hollinger struck his pick into unbelievably rich gold ore in 1909, there was a great rush of others to get their stakes in for miles around his discovery, and thus the Porcupine camp came into being.

To-day, the Porcupine Camp has a population of 20,000 people, and it is a great "gold factory." The annual pay roll is \$6,000,000, and its mines have produced hundreds of millions of dollars worth of gold bullion, and have ore reserves blocked out to assure the continuance of this busy community for years to come. It is even predicted that there are a number of other Hollinger mines in the vicinity yet to be developed.

Kapuskasing cordially extends its felicitations to "The Porcupine" on its silver anniversary. A friendly spirit prevails between the two towns, and they both look forward to the time when a more direct highway between them will permit of a much closer contact.
