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TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files.

At the golf course here ten years ago the Town won from the Mine in a local golf tournament with ideal weather for the play. The Advance noted that the Timmins Golf Club had joined the Canadian Amateur Golf Union.

Ten years ago Timmins Masons enjoyed a very pleasant at Home, the event being under the joint auspices of the Northern Lights Chapter, Royal Arch, and Golden Beaver Lodge, A. F. & A. M. For the dancing Wolno's orchestra provided the best of music. Confetti dances, lucky number fox-trots, balloon dances, square dances and other features were enjoyed. Prizes for the lucky number dance were awarded to Mrs. Leighton and Mr. Waddle, of Schumacher, Mr. W. H. Pritchard was master of ceremonies for the square dancing. Comic songs by Jas. Cowan and A. J. Downie, in costume, added to the interest, while Tommy Nixon gave a thrilling exhibition of the black art. Refreshments were served during the evening. Card tables were provided upstairs for those not dancing.

The two-room house on Bannerman avenue owned by J. Turcotte was destroyed by fire ten years ago, building and contents being a total loss. The fire was believed to be due to the explosion of a coal oil stove in the house.

The production at the Dome Mines for May, 1924, was well over \$370,000.00. Jos. Basill, for some time a resident of Timmins, where he and his wife lived on Third avenue, was shot to death ten years ago at Buffalo. He had been resident in Hamilton and went over to Buffalo on business. A car drove up alongside him as he walked on street and he was riddled with bullets. The explanation of the murder was given at the time as being due to exposure of high-grading activities of some friends of the murdered man. The widow claimed that her husband was innocent of any informing as well as guileless of any connection with high-grading.

Ten years ago the Hollinger Rugby Club was organized with E. Harris, president; P. B. Everest, secretary-treasurer; A. L. Thomas, captain.

The Advance noted big improvements made in the grounds of the Baptist church through the efforts of the men of the congregation, the ladies also doing their part by providing refreshments on the evenings the men were working.

Ten years ago Shankman Bros. store on Third avenue was entered and over \$2000.00 in cash taken from the safe. No goods were taken and cheques in most cases were left behind, the burglars being apparently after cash only.

Ten years ago The Advance was urging the appointment of a game warden for this district, the matter being mentioned from week to week both editorially and in the news columns. The injury being done to the district through the breach of fish and game laws was explained from time to time. It took some time to impress the question on the government but eventually a game warden was appointed with very great benefit to the district.

The matter of paving the main streets of the town was a live question ten years ago. A front page article in The Advance of June 4th, 1924, said: "The permanent roadway on Pine street from Fourth avenue, to Second, and on Third avenue, from the station down, will be proceeded with this summer and hurried to completion. The suggestion is made that a permanent road be put in through to the river, instead of just to the Queen's hotel corner. The plan is to make the lower end of cheaper but still of permanent type. Such a roadway is, of course, badly needed, and if the property owners are agreeable it can be put through. During the past week the difficulty of financing has been adjusted, and the work can go on just as arrangements are made. The bank will provide the necessary accommodation until the debentures or bonds are sold. It is possible that the Ontario Government may bear a part of the cost of the work."

The appointment of an assistant manager for the Hollinger Consolidated was announced by The Advance as follows:—"Mr. John Knox, general superintendent of the Calumet and Hecla Consolidated Copper Co., of Calumet, Michigan, U.S.A. will join the staff of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, Ltd., about the middle of the present month as assistant general manager. Mr. Knox comes to Porcupine with an enviable record as a man and a miner after seventeen years of work in the copper country. He is a native of Hamilton, Ontario. There will be very general interest in this announcement, which has official confirmation, and there will also be a general opinion that the general manager, Mr. A. F. Brigham, and his competent and earnest staff, will find in Mr. Knox a very valuable ally in the work that has received so much of Mr. Brigham's great talent, organizing ability and courageous foresight,—the work of expanding and extending the Hollinger into the greatest gold mining industry in the world."

Ten years ago The Advance was urging the value of parks and playgrounds to a town. Previous to that The Advance had suggested the desirability of the town purchasing lots in the adjacent area for park use as the town expanded. At the time The Advance first proposed this land could have been secured at a merely nominal figure. The expansion of the town seemed certain but at the same time few indeed expected it would expand to the extent that it has done.

The Advance ten years ago noted that the A.S.D. Club was preparing special quarters at Golden City for the summer for the members of the club.

The New Empire theatre was crowded to the doors on June 1st, 1924, for the special showing of a picture in which Miss Margery Wilson had the leading part. The big crowd was delighted with the picture and the excellent acting. Miss Margery Wilson proved to be an actress of outstanding ability and much charm. She was in Timmins selling stock in a company being formed to produce her next picture. She had already three successful productions to her credit.

Ten years ago Earl J. Sellard was in town with a view to organizing a company to build a big hotel here. He interested members of the Kiwanis Club and board of trade and a committee was formed to carry on the project. Eventually, however, this notable need of the town was supplied in easier way by Leo Mascioli building the Empire hotel to give the town a hotel and service worthy of the importance of the community.

Ten years ago Timmins was the winner of the King football trophy. The cup was assured to the local team when in a game at the end of May they defeated Kirkland Lake.

The burning down of the Coniagas mill at Cobalt ten years ago with a loss of about \$300,000.00 was noted by The Advance in its issue of June 4th, 1924.

Among the local and personal items in The Advance ten years ago were the following:—"Mr. Mac Lang, M.P.P. is in town to-day." "Golden City is already attracting its quota of visitors On Sunday a number of the young people of the town spent the day in this resort of the Porcupine Camp, and Tuesday, being a holiday, the King's birthday, quite a number availed themselves of this opportunity to picnic at Golden City." "While turning in front of Rev. Fr. Theriault's on Saturday evening, Mr. H. A. Proctor accidentally backed his auto over the side of the road, the auto falling down the embankment into the public school grounds. The auto turned over more than once and was badly smashed up, but Mr. Proctor escaped with practically no injury." "Sunday about noon, Mr. E. St. Onge, nephew of Mr. Dan St. Onge, fell from the balcony of the St. Onge building, a drop of some 12 or 14 feet, but escaped serious injury. He was leaning over the railing and overbalanced himself, pitching down to the ground below. He struck upon the stones in the ditch but fell fair upon his back. He was bruised and shaken up but escaped serious hurt." "Mrs. J. A. McInnis is in Toronto attending the National Convention of the Daughters of the Empire, as representative of the Timmins Chapter of which she is regent." "Mr. J. E. Newton is spending a few weeks in Toronto, and while there will take specialists' treatment." "Mrs. Gordon Mitchell and daughter, Miss Jean, now of Winnipeg, are visiting George Lake." "Mr. H. W. Warren left this week for

a holiday in the South." "Mr. S. L. Macdonald, better known as "Punch," left on Sunday for his home in Hamilton." "Sincere sympathy will be extended to Mr. and Mrs. P. Edlund, of Schumacher, in the death of their infant child, just a little over a month old, on Thursday last." "Miss Mullin, recently Victorian Order Nurse, at Cobalt, has taken up her new duties as Public Health Nurse for the town of Timmins." "Mr. J. R. O'Neill, of North Bay, is a visitor to town to-day." "Mr. and Mrs. F. C. H. Simms are spending a two weeks' vacation in the South." "Mr. and Mrs. Ross Way, now of Hamilton, were visitors here this week at the home of Mrs. Way's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Richardson." "Rev. J. D. Parks is on a visit to the South." "Mr. C. H. Poirier, of New York, is in the camp this week. Mr. Poirier and Mr. H. Heine leave this week for a trip to Rebyn." "The youngsters gave thanks Tuesday that Kings have birthdays and that the King was not born on February 29th. Tuesday was a holiday for all the schools. There were some flags flying in the town." "Born—in Timmins, on Sunday, June 1st, to Mr. and Mrs. R. Allen—a daughter." "Mr. Geo. Gray of Toronto, formerly famous in baseball circles here as "Pop Gray," is in the camp on a visit and is being warmly welcomed by all who knew this popular old-timer in early days." "Bobby Wallace, of the Dome team, who was accidentally injured in the football match here last week, has been ordered by Dr. Kirkup to remain in bed for a week. After this rest-up it is expected he will be all right again and all football enthusiasts in the North will wish Bobby the best of luck and the best of speedy recovery."

RESTIGOUCHE Salmon

1 lb. 33c

Baked Restigouche Salmon
Select thick steaks of Restigouche salmon, or a whole piece of suitable size. Wipe with a damp cloth. Place fish on a rack in the roasting pan. Dress with butter, salt, pepper, and herbs or dipping. Bake in a moderate oven (350° to 375° F.) until the fish will separate easily. For a large piece of fish allow 10 minutes per lb., and 10 minutes extra.
Bake frequently during cooking. Garnish with lemon slices and parsley, for serving.

Over Fried Salmon Steaks
Select thick steaks of Restigouche salmon. Coat with seasoned salt. Fry in hot oil, dip in diluted tomato sauce, then coat completely with seasoned salad crumbs. The goodness with salt and herbs in every hot oven (425° to 450° F.) until done. Bake frequently during cooking.
