## Three Months Term in High-grade Case

Kasimer Pucitanski Sentenced by Judge Caron on Saturday. Time in Jail to Count as Part of Term Imposed by Judge

At Cochrane on Saturday last Kasimer Pucitanski, who gave his address as Kirkland Lake, when arrested in a local hotel at Timmins on April 19th, was sentenced by Judge Caron to three months in jail, the time he had been held in custody awaiting trial to count as part of the sentence. As he had been held for a month and 20 days, he has only another month and 10 days to serve. The charge on which Pucitanski was found guilty was that of being illegally in possession of gold ore. When he appeared at Timmins before Magistrate Atkinson he elected to be tried before a judge. After some evidence had been submitted he was committed for trial. After being held in custody for the necessary bail Pucitanski asked for a speedy trial before Judge Caron and this was held on Saturday last. The witnesses for the prosecution included Chief R. Paul, Sergt. Halley and former Constable Gilligan, as well as W. R. Dodge, assayer. The evidence went to show that a quantity of gold ore was found in a club bag at a Timmins hotel, the club bag being believed to be the property of Pucitanski, and the key for this club bag being found in his possession. As the answers given by him to the police in regard to his possession of the gold ore did not appear satisfactory to the police, Pucitanski was placed under arrest and the club bag and gold ore were taken in charge by the police. At court on Saturday the accused claimed that he had taken the gold as a sort of security for some money that he said he had loaned the man who gave him the gold. He suggested that he was simply holding the gold ore simply as collateral for the money he said was owing to him. Judge Caron found Pucitanski guilty of the charge against him and imposed the three months' term with the time already spent in jail to count as part of the sentence.

Mrs. Harmer, who formerly lived in Perth County, came north at the time the railway was being built. She settled with her husband and family in the Milberta section, New Liskeard district, about thirty years ago, and at a time when there were few families in that area. She has just celebrated her 93rd birthday at the home of a son, four generations joining in the festivities on the occasion. ## "Gold," Magazine of North, on "Central Porcupine"

Several recent references have been made in The Advance to the Central Porcupine Mines, recently organized to develop a block of some 520 acres in the central part of the Porcupine camp and adjacent to the big producers. It may be interesting to readers to note what "Gold," the bright magazine of the North, has to say of this property and its prospects. In the current issue of the "magazine of the North," "Gold" says:—

"Announcement of the formation of Central Porcupine Mines Limited to develop a block of approximately 520 acres, directly adjoining the major producing gold mines of the Porcupine district, is regarded one of the outstanding constructive developments of recent years in this the premier gold-field.

"Many attempts have been made in the past ten years, or since Porcupine geological conditions have been understood, to group this acreage into one company, but previously without success. The fact that a consolidation was not brought about has been one of the main factors retarding development of the merged property.

"The holdings of the company comprise four claims of the Gold Centre Mines Ltd., in which a controlling stock interest is held; and outright two claims of Parac Porcupine Mines three claims of the Giggam group and four claims of the Digby Vet group. As the surface of the property is mainly low, swampy ground, now partly covered with mill tailings, it is impossible to do much surface work. A limited amount of diamond drilling has been done in previous years and it is stated that a study of the available drill records confirm the presence of favourable structural conditions on the property.

"Arrangements have been entered into with the Coniarum Mines for the use of the 'Goldale' shaft, which has been sunk to a depth of 1,000 feet. A cross-cut will be put through to the Central Porcupine ground and preliminary exploration work will be carried out at the 1,000 foot horizon.

"In a geological summary, Douglas G. H. Wright states, 'In comparison from a structural viewpoint, the Central Porcupine Mines area is quite similar to that of the Hollinger, McIntyre and Coniarum mine areas, as all lie within the same major synclinal zone and are intruded by quartz porphyry. The sequence of geological events occurred contemporaneously with like geological events within the productive areas of the Porcupine gold-field. These facts alone earmark the company's property as one of great merit and well worthy of intensive exploration which it is believed will be rewarded by the discovery therein of commercial ore bodies similar to those found on the 'Big Four' mines of the camp.

"Mr. Wright states that as 'Central Porcupine Mines Limited, commencing as it does with ample financing and a three-years' working contract on the Coniarum shaft, is starting in on the exploration and development of the outstanding 'geological bet' in the Province of Ontario.

## Attractive New Service Stations Open to Public

Many favorable comments have been made in regard to the attractiveness and elegance of the new service station opened recently near the subway and called the "Subway Service Station." The Subway Service station, the newest of the three modern stations is owned and operated by Mr. Perrault of the City Service Station who also recently opened the Matagami Service Station located at the corner of Wilson avenue and Cameron streets.

## Benefit of New Road to Christmas Lake

Through Efforts of A. F. Kenning, M. L. A., Road Now Being Built Through Godfrey and Turnbull Townships. Prospectors Appreciate

Recently there has been renewed interest and activity in the country between here and Christmas Lake and recently prospectors suggested a road through Godfrey and Turnbull townships to Christmas Lake. The matter was taken up with A. F. Kenning, M. L. A., and with his usual interest and effort in behalf of anything for this section of the North he impressed upon the Government the desirability of this new road. The advantage to prospectors and others was stressed as well as the benefit of the proposed road in the matter of opening up new and promising country. This new work is in actual progress on the building of this much needed road through Godfrey and Turnbull townships to Christmas Lake where the major holdings are the Valliant group of claims very promising property that will be given additional chance now to make good on account of the road service that will be available. What is true of the Christmas Lake claims is equally true of other claims in the intervening area. It is expected that the new road will be completed in three weeks. The building of this piece of roadway is much appreciated by prospectors and travellers alike in the Kamiskotia district. The new road will be about 14 or 15 miles in length. Christmas Lake is about 22 or 23 miles from Timmins, and with the completion of the new road there will be road connection from Timmins to Christmas Lake.

Prospectors who spoke to The Advance this week about this new road said it would prove of great value to the Kamiskotia country and they expressed appreciation of the interest and effort of A. F. Kenning, M. L. A., on this and all other work for this part of the North.

## MAIL AND EMPIRE GAINS CIRCULATION IN TIMMINS

Special representatives of the Toronto Mail and Empire have been in town recently looking to the increase of the circulation of the paper in this town and district. From information to hand they have been eminently successful, having a good newspaper to offer and also having the advantage now of having The Mail and Empire delivered here on the day of publication. The Globe was the pioneer in giving this service to this part of the North but The Mail and Empire now shares this honour with the result that its circulation has been materially increased. The service is made possible by the use of trucks to take the papers from Toronto to North Bay where they are placed on No. 47 and reach Timmins in the early evening.

## Hon. Chas. McCrea Using Aeroplane to Get Round

Years ago The Advance advocated the use of the aeroplane in the North Land Even before the war concluded, The Advance was pointing out how specially useful from the commercial viewpoint the aeroplane would prove in this country of great distances. Because of the immense territory to be covered in this North Land, the aeroplane seemed to have a special future here, and it was easy to mention particular lines in which it could be used to special advantage. Few, however, thought that in the course of a few years the aeroplane would be in common use for election purposes. Such, however, is the case and there seems to be particular aptitude in the fact that one of those making special use of the aeroplane is that pioneer of the North Hon. Chas. McCrea, Minister of Mines. Hon. Mrs. McCrea has found that the only way he can hope to cover his riding in the few days at his disposal is by the use of the aeroplane. Now Hon. M. McCrea does not favour the airship as a means of travel. He would prefer the T. & N.O. or even the C.N.R. or the C.P.R., but none of these lines are available to help him out in this particular case. Some men would let the matter slide, but that is not the way of Hon. Chas. McCrea. He believes that every place possible should be visited and so starts out as a matter of course to visit every section of his big riding. That means the use of the aeroplane for only by that medium could he hope to see all the people and visit all the different sections of the riding. As a consequence Hon. M. McCrea has been busy for several days and the aeroplane has been in almost constant demand. The aeroplane in this, as in other cases, is proving of very notable advantage. Journeys that would ordinarily take days are being covered by aeroplane in a few hours. It looks as if Hon. Chas. McCrea would be able to visit all sections of his riding before the election—thanks to the aeroplane.
