Many "Dumb" Animals Do Not Act So Dumb After All

(Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph)

The average man or woman who, as an animal-lover, is probably convinced that his or her pet understands a half dozen familiar commands, may be surprised to learn that several "animal dictionaries" have been written.

Gabriele D'Annunzio, the Italian poet, has announced that he will include a complete glossary of the canine language in his new book, "Lives of Illustrious Dogs." The book is to be modeled after Plutarch's "Lives."

Other animals whose vocabularies have been recorded are the monkey, the horse and the cat. An American woman, Miss Blanch W. Learned, was responsible for classifying 32 terms of the chimpanzee, together with the meaning of each. Other scientists have tabulated 12 "words" of the marmoset language and 14 of the gibbon's.


The horse is said to speak with "six words and three kinds of neighing." Cats produce 15 sounds according to the experts, each with its distinct interpretation. There are 12 "words" in the hen's vocabulary and 5 in the rooster's.

From all this it seems that it is high time that the phrase, "our dumb friends," went into the discard.

Another Big Police Court Docket Here

Young Man Sentenced for Breaking into Store. Several Speeders and Reckless Driving Cases. Some Liquor Cases.

There was another big docket at police court on Tuesday with three more cases for Wednesday morning. Some of the cases were important.

The store of Geo. Boychuk, corner Maple and Sixth, was broken into last week and about \$32.00 worth of cigarettes stolen. Through the good work of the police two young men were arrested and charged with the offence. A few of the cigarettes were recovered and the one young man gave evidence clearly implicating Stanley Norikum. Norikum conducted his own defence but was found guilty. To give him a further chance, however, he was tentatively dealt with by the magistrate, the sentence being not less than three months nor more than one year at the reformatory. The other young man was dismissed, his evidence showing that he had not taken part in the actual robbery. Only a small part of the stolen goods were recovered.

Another remand was granted in the case of Nicholas Ferris charged with illegal possession of moonshine.

On charge of illegally having liquor Antoine Couturie was sentenced to three months.

Remands of a week were made in the cases of M. Bainch and M. Buthovick, charged with taking to their own use money belonging to the Farmers' Associated Dairies. Bail was allowed.

A remand of a week was made in the case of Oscar Beaudoin, charged with supplying liquor to an intoxicated person.

Four common drunks, one a lady, paid \$10.00 and costs. A fifth went to jail for 30 days.

For not stopping at intersections, three paid \$2 and costs, while another was dismissed.

Five speeders paid \$10 and costs each, four of them pleading guilty. One similar case was withdrawn.

Three pleaded guilty to reckless driving and each paid \$10.00 and costs. Another highway traffic case was adjourned till called on.

A man caught with a bottle was fined \$100 and costs.

One of the men in a mutual charge of assault failed to appear. The case against the other man was dismissed, while a warrant was issued for the missing man, who is believed to have gone to Matachewan.
