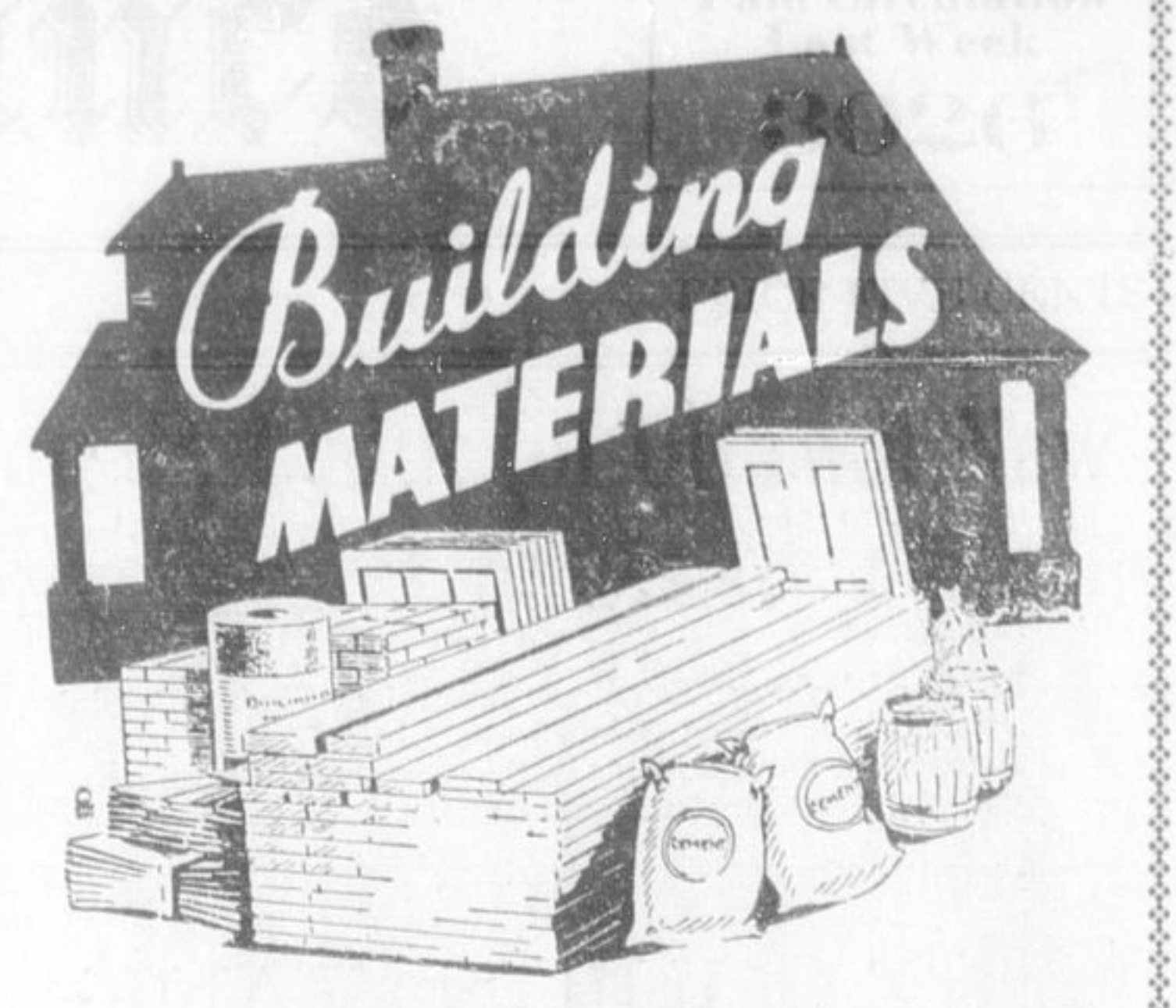

There are swanky names now For what used to be called "The Hill." You can no longer live on the "Rocks." Or just near somebody's mill.

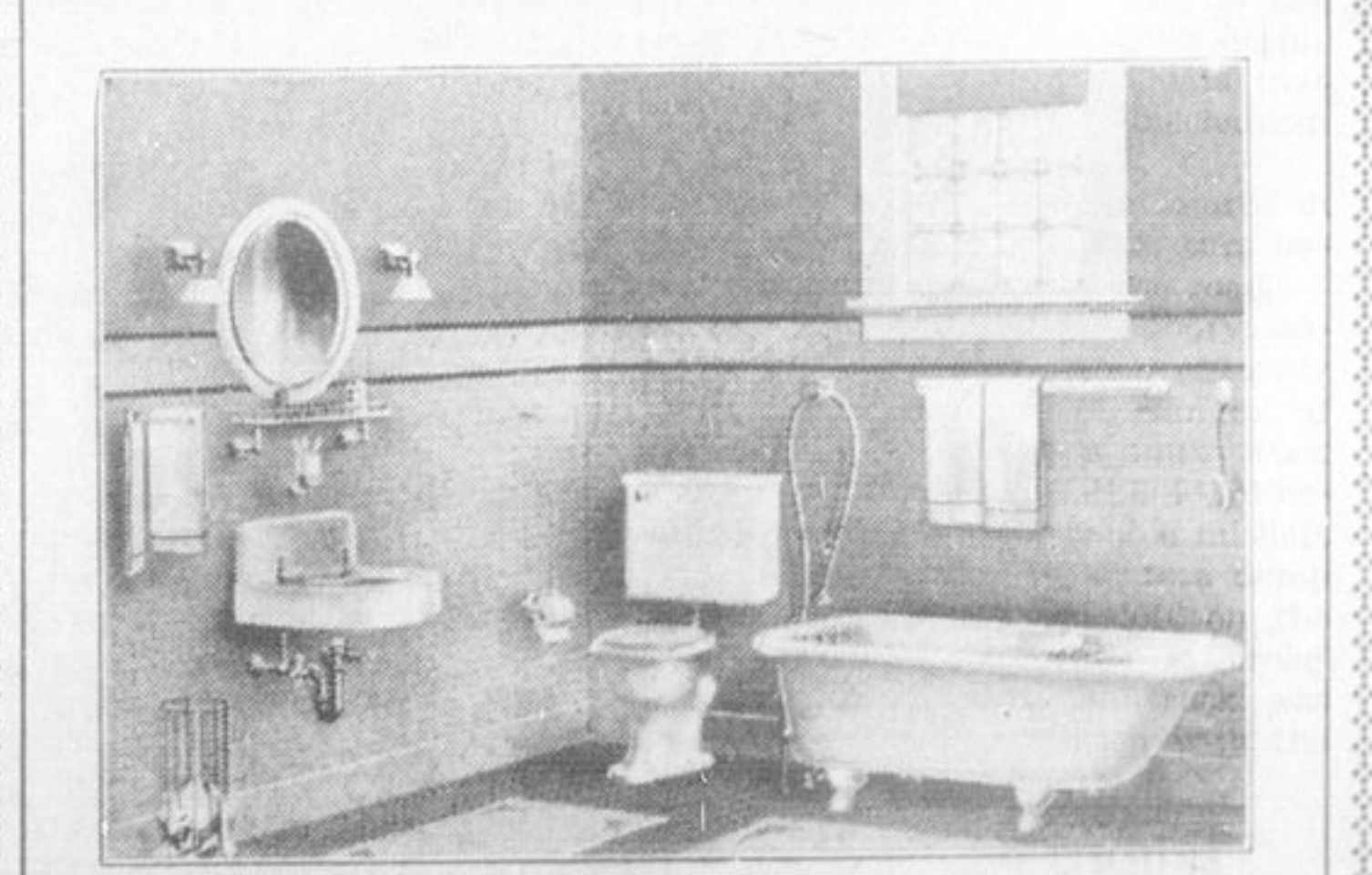
