#### RESULTS OF VOTING IN THE RIDING OF NORTH COCHRANE

In a great many of the smaller polls he received no votes at all, the majority still adhering to the party system and chiefly the two-party system at that.

### Funeral on Monday of Charles Mazzuca

Well-Known and Popular Merchant of Moneta Passed Away in Toronto Hospital. Funeral With Masonic Honours

There was very general regret in Timmins and district last week when it was learned that Charles Mazzuca, a well-known and popular merchant of the Moneta section of Timmins had passed away in Toronto General hospital. The late Mr. Mazzuca had not been in good health for some weeks past and had come to Toronto for an operation. His death followed on Friday, July 8th.

The late Mr. Mazzuca was a native of Italy and was 63 years of age at the time of death. He had been a respected resident of Timmins for some 14 years, and his genial friendly presence before his store in Moneta was a familiar and popular sight. He always had a friendly word for all and had a wide acquaintance, being highly regarded by all who knew him. The late Mr. Mazzuca is survived by his widow, one daughter and four sons, and to these the sincere sympathy of all is extended in their loss. The daughter is Mrs. L. Clausi (Nevada), and the sons are Caesar, Michael, Edward and Gino.

The late Mr. Mazzuca was a valued member of the Masonic Order and the funeral on Monday afternoon was with Masonic honours, the Golden Beaver Lodge, A.F. & A.M., attending in a body and taking part in the last sad rites for their departed brother. #### Death of One of the Early Residents of Cobalt Camp

The Halleyburian last week says:—"One of the early residents of Cobalt, Mrs. Albert Morin, died at her home there on Saturday morning last, June 30th, in her 62nd year. Some 22 years ago she had suffered a stroke, from which she never fully recovered, although she was able to be around the house until five weeks ago, when she became seriously ill. 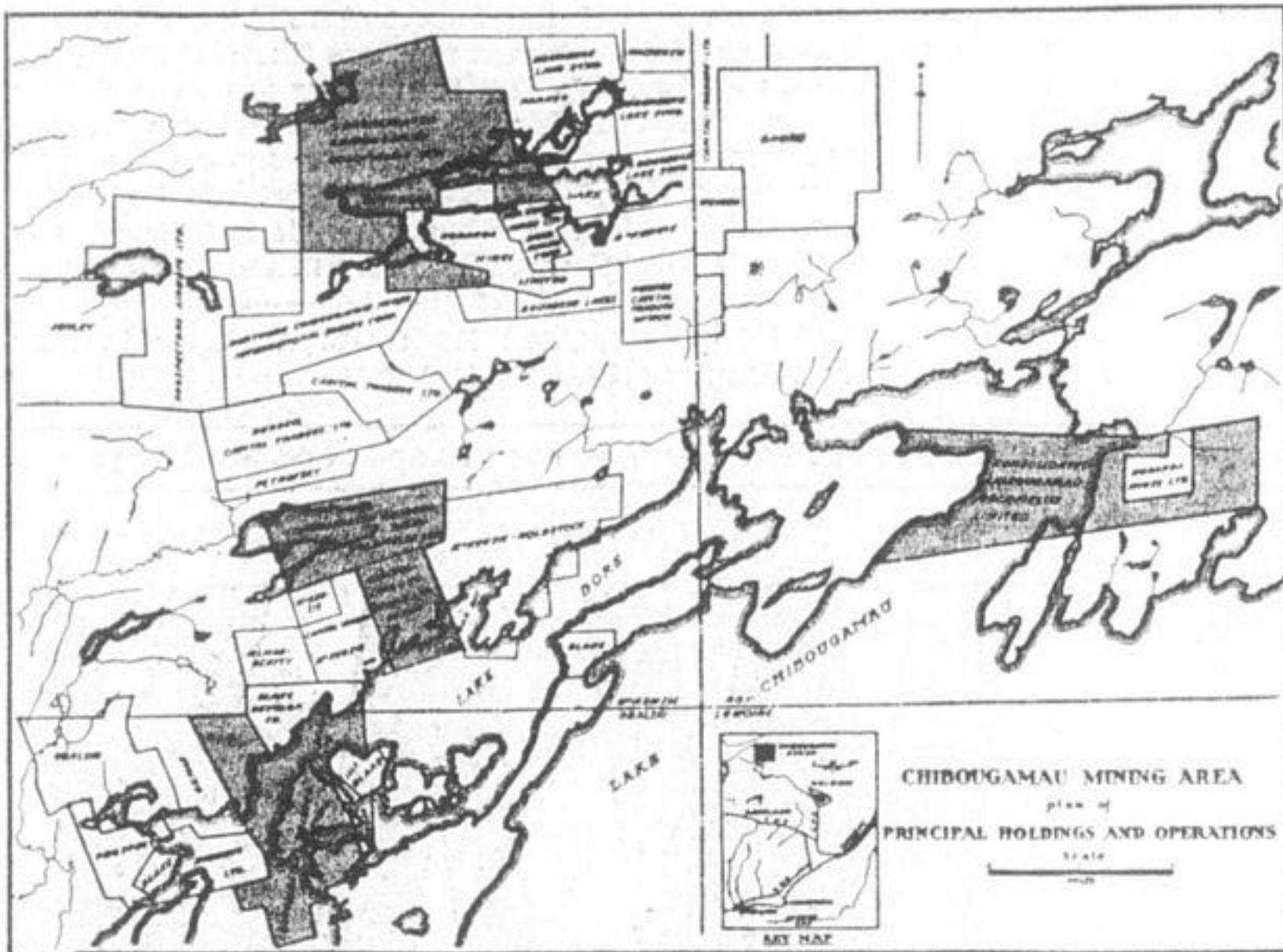

#### GOLDALDE MINES TAKING OVER PROSPECT IN LONG LAC AREA

A letter of advice to shareholders is being prepared by Goldalde Mines Limited to the effect that a stock option in Birch Bay Gold Mines Limited, Long Lac prospect, will be available to them. The property is understood to have some good assays and diamond drilling is to be started soon. Goldalde has funds for outside operations, a recent estimate of its cash and stocks being \$450,000. 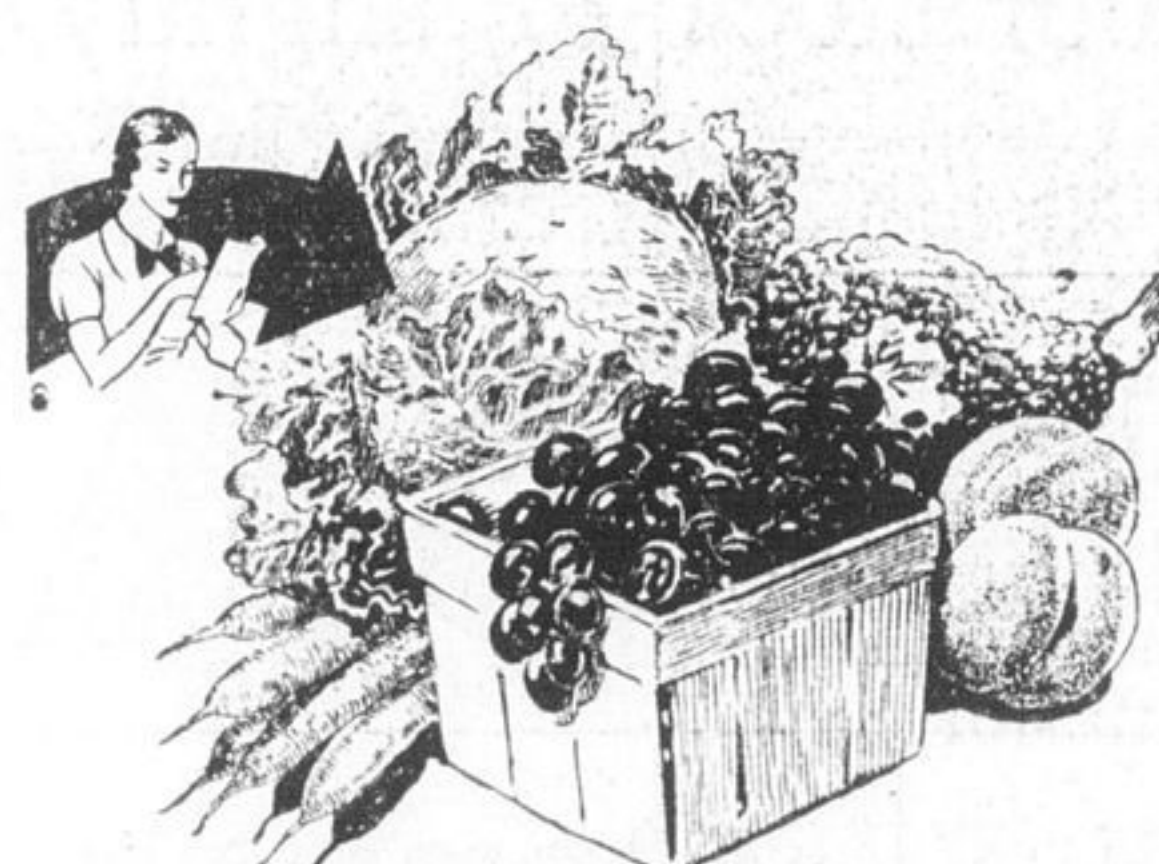
